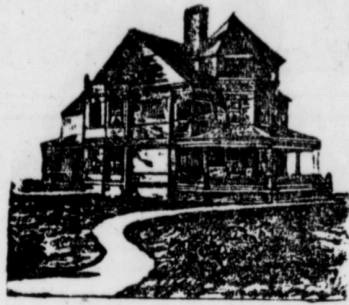

## Report Is Given On Choi Chong

Kang Chong Koo, superintendent of the Taeja Orphanage, Korea, sent a report to the Donegal high school on the school's adopted boy, Choi Chong, which was received this week.

Last fall, the student council of the school adopted a project of supporting an overseas orphan by sending a cash contribution monthly through the Foster Parents Plan. They were given Choi Chong and have been receiving monthly letters from him since the time of his "adoption".

The Taeja Orphanage keeps 114 children and the building is a three hundred year old temple which is located at a historic hill surrounded by nature's greens. Behind the building there is a high mountain and a clear stream. In the summer, the children swim in the stream and in the winter they skate on the icy stream.

He announced that through the local students' help through Foster Parents, Choi Chong is attending the second grade of middle school. His school record places him in the upper part of his class and his favorite subject is natural science. He has forty roommates. He is on duty for children's health so that he works for the orphanage in cleaning and the children's hygiene.

Since he was adopted, his life became happy and hopeful. He will soon prepare for high school examinations in March of 1958. His health is fine and his measurements are normal for his age.

## YOUNG PEOPLE SEEK SCHOLARSHIPS

Nearly 300 young men and women, including 23 from this area, have made application for six 1957 Pennsylvania Power & Light educational awards for study in local colleges and universities.

Chas. E. Oakes, utility president, announced that winners of this year's competition will be named shortly. When the 1957 winners begin their studies this fall, there will be PP&L scholarship winners in each of the four college undergraduate classes for the first time.
