



### Council Votes To Erect 40 New Street Markers

Over forty street markers will be placed in the borough in the immediate future it was announced at the Monday night meeting of borough council. These markers will be placed at intersections that had previously never been marked. Street lights are being placed on East Main Street beyond the Little Chiques Creek. Sixteen new poles are being erected in the vicinity at the present time.

The group agreed to meet at 8 p.m. instead of 7:30 p.m. during the months of June, July and August. John Schroll, East Donegal Street, was appointed health officer by the state for the year. Council turned over a list of individual homes that are to be checked as to the possibility of being fire hazards. Ray Myers, fire chief, was appointed to conduct the survey and report back at the next meeting. The surroundings around the homes are in question at the present time.

A set of three "baby" swings was ordered purchased for the borough park but will not be erected until the park has been completely resurfaced due to the extension of the sewage lines running through the area. Borough president, was in charge of the meeting.

Also, truck service sends mail eastward at 8:30 a.m. and a second train dispatch of first class mail westward at 10:50 a.m. Both east and west service—one by truck and the other by train—is available at about 6 p.m.

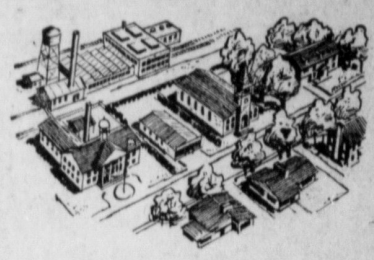
The annual Junior-senior prom of the Donegal high school will be held next Friday, May 17, in the gym. The junior class is host to the two-class event.

### Make Sewage Notice Complaints In Writing

Residents of the borough who wish to issue complaints concerning their sewage notices issued recently are informed that their complaints shall be in writing and sent to the Mount Joy Authority. If possible, the persons should have their deeds accompany their complaints. These deeds will not be retained. This notice was released at the Tuesday night meeting of the local borough authority in the firehouse.

Fifteen bids were received for supplies for the sewage plant. These will be studied and tabulated within the next month before the winning bid is announced. The opening of bids for the macadam road leading to the plant was postponed until the June meeting.

Two representatives of the AMP Company attended the meeting and requested a sewage line to a plant adjacent to the borough. Since the request is for an industrial site, the request was granted both by the authority and borough council. Robert Rosser, authority chairman, will work out the details with representatives in the Harrisburg office in the near future.

A report was given that approximately 170 applications have already been filed for connection permits at the authority office in the local firehouse. Condemnation papers were passed by the body concerning one property on Frederick Street in order that the sewage line may be completed in the area.

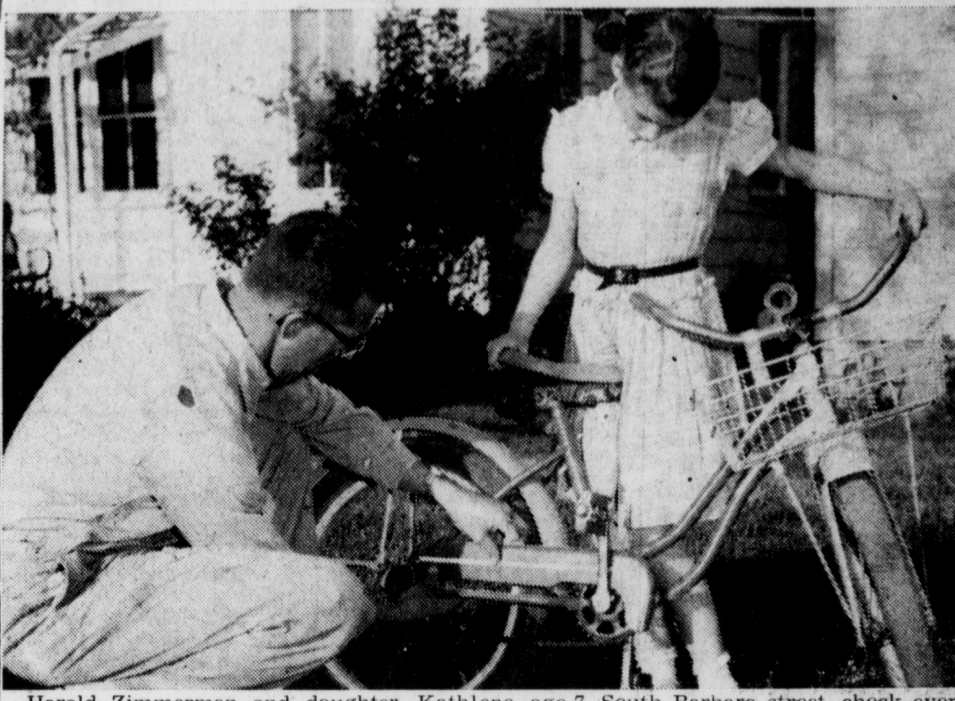
