1558 persons were admitted to the Lancaster General Hospital during the month of April, it was announced today by Dr. Donald C. Smelzer, Executive Director of the hospital, at a meeting of the Board of Directors. The admitted persons required 11,655 days of hospital service. Other census figures include: Patients discharged during the month, 1539; number of operations, 842; number of births, 257. 1057 patients were treated in the Receiving Ward, 506 patients were treated in the Dispensary with 719 visits. The average number of patients per day was 388. The highest number of patients for one day during the month was 418 on Thursday April 25th.
