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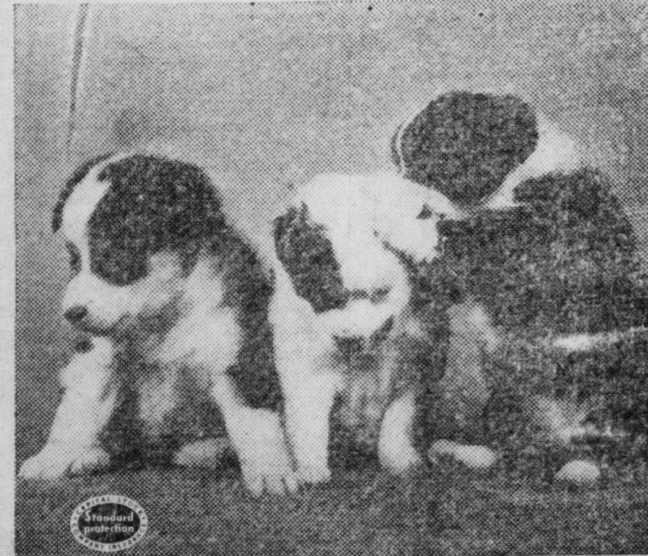

Rotarians Hear Inspirational Talk

An inspirational address concerning Rotary and its objectives was given to the local service club Tuesday noon at its weekly luncheon meeting, held at Hostetters. The speaker, Walter Miller of Harrisburg, used Rotary's "Four-Way Test" to emphasize to Rotarians the value of applying the Four-Way Test to activities of individuals and of the club. He called the test "an inflexible yardstick" for determining policy and actions and likened it in its sphere of concern to the constitution and the Golden Rule in their. The test, a widely known basis for action, asks before any decision: "Is it true?" "Is it fair to all concerned?" "Will it build goodwill and better friendships?" and "will it be beneficial to all concerned?" The program was arranged and the speaker introduced by Ray Wiley.

To Serve U.S. In Korea

Major Harry G. Walters, 90, East Main St., Mount Joy, native of Mt. Joy, will leave for Korea on June 13 where he will serve a 16-month tour of duty as an Army logistics officer.

Major Walters is the son of Harry G. Walters, Sr., 254 Marietta St., Mount Joy. His wife, the former Marguerite E. Keller, is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Clayton B. Keller of Mt. Joy.

Major Walters' military assignment is with the Philadelphia Army Air Defense Command with headquarters at Swarthmore, Penna. as Group intelligence and public relations officer. The Philadelphia Defense is responsible for protecting the Philadelphia industrial area from air attack through the use of the NIKE-AJAX guided missile.

Major Walters, a veteran of World War II was associated with E. W. Timper of Merchandising and Manufacturing Associates, Inc., Lancaster, from 1948 to 1950. His Lancaster residence was at Garden Hill, R2.

In 1950 he returned to active military duty with the 899th Army Antiaircraft Battalion, Pennsylvania National Guard. He was assigned to Germany prior to being sent to Swarthmore, Pa.
