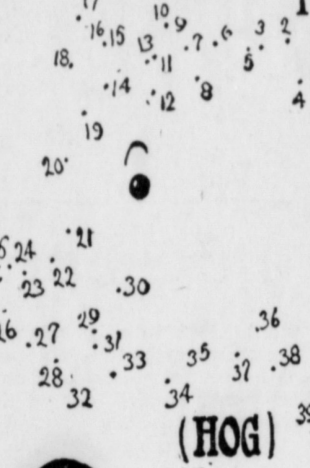
William G. Foerch of River Edge, N. J., formerly of Mt. Joy, visited here a couple of days this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl S. Krall and daughter, Ruth, have gone to Indiana to attend the wedding of the Krall's son, Carl Richard.

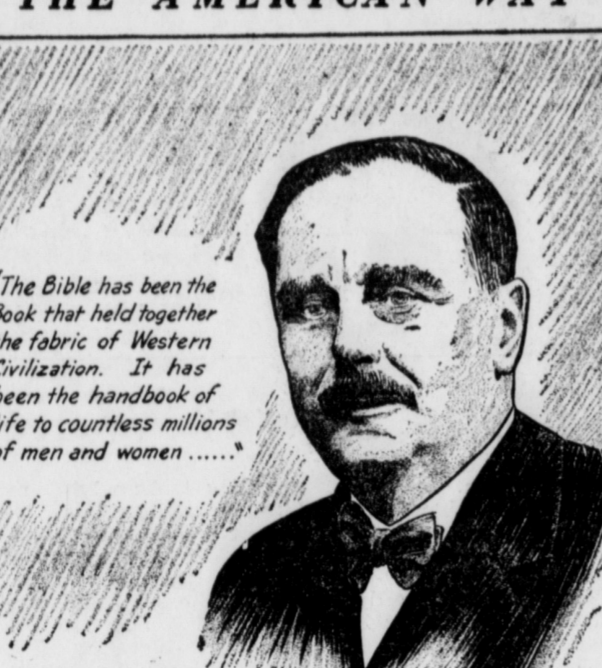

overwhelming, the matter is brought to a hearing for investigation and decision. If the number of signers in favor is only a simple majority, the matter will be given more careful attention by the courts. If less than a majority are favorable the matter holds little weight in court.

Then, if the matter is considered farther, a new area for proposed annexation may be set up with new boundary lines and the process begun again.
