a way fortunate in having
the plant located as it is on
the side of a hill. By arrang-
ing the various processes in
order one below the other
on the slope, much of the
transfer from one tank to
another can be accomplished
by gravity rather than by
pumping.

What the actual volume of
the plant will be is not ex-
actly known, until it is
handling all connections.
However, it is logical to an-
ticipate something between
50 and 100 gallons of water
per person in the area being
served.

However, the plant has
been designed with a far
greater capacity than can
be envisioned for many
years. Extended need has
been given special attention
where expansion would be
the most expensive—namely
the two-story high digester
tanks and equipment.

The control building,
which is concrete, brick fac-
ed, houses the controls and
automatic equipment, record-
ing devices and a small
laboratory for sampling and
analyzing.

Truly, the plant is to be
an attractive, functional
property which handles in a
modern manner a problem
which must be faced—turn-
ing sewage into clear, spark-
ling water, pure as from a
running spring.

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

Q—I am a disabled Kor-
ean veteran and I would like
to take vocational rehabili-
tation training in a European
college. Is this possible?

A—Under the law, it
would not be possible. Voc-
ational rehabilitation is not
available in foreign countries
except in the Philippines
for eligible U. S. citizens liv-
ing there.

Q—I have just come out
of military service. Will the
VA find me a job?

A—Finding employment
for veterans is not one of
VA's functions, under the
law. What you should do is
apply at your nearest public
employment office.
