The Landisville Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 5995, played host to the Lancaster County Council VFW at a meeting of the organization last Friday night at the Mountville VFW post 8757.

In charge of the meeting were George Taylor, Landisville, commander of the Hempfield post VFW, and Mrs. Winifred Brendle, president of the county council group, Ladies Auxiliaries.

The meeting marked the first business session for the newly elected officers and the last meeting before the department encampment to be held at Harrisburg in July.

15 States Increase Disability Benefits

A total of 15 states have increased maximum workmen's compensation benefits and several others are expected to follow suit before current legislative sessions are completed.

In addition to raising its maximum \$2 to \$30, Ver-

mont also allows \$2 a week for each dependent under the age of 21. Wyoming, although it did not change its top figure of \$46.15, now permits an employer to collect that amount if he has four dependents, instead of the previously required six.

New York changed its statute to permit coverage for disabilities caused by ionizing radiation and removed some time limits for contracting diseases and filing claims. New Mexico made coverage of the law compulsory rather than elective and its administration was removed from the hands of the courts and placed with a Workmen's Compensation Commission.
