Stop Car Sales On Sunday

Final enactment of the "Sunday Closing Bill," which came with the signature of Gov. George M. Leader was hailed by Edwin W. Parkinson, Hardsburg, assistant Manager of the Pennsylvania Automotive Association, as "one of the most popular legislative proposals ever proposed by the new car dealers' group."

Parkinson said of the new law, which applies only to the sale of new and used cars on Sunday in the Commonwealth:

"We consider the Sunday Closing Bill one of the most important steps in the promotion of good employer-employee relations made in recent years. It assures our salesmen they will have the same opportunity for rest and recreation on Sunday as enjoyed by salesmen in other businesses."

The first Sunday affected by this new law will be July 14.

The law provides that information on a violation may be brought within 72 hours after an alleged offense, but "not thereafter."

Conviction on a first offense would result in a fine not exceeding \$100. A second or any subsequent offense within a period of one year after conviction for a first offense would result in a fine not exceeding \$200 or imprisonment not exceeding 30 days.


