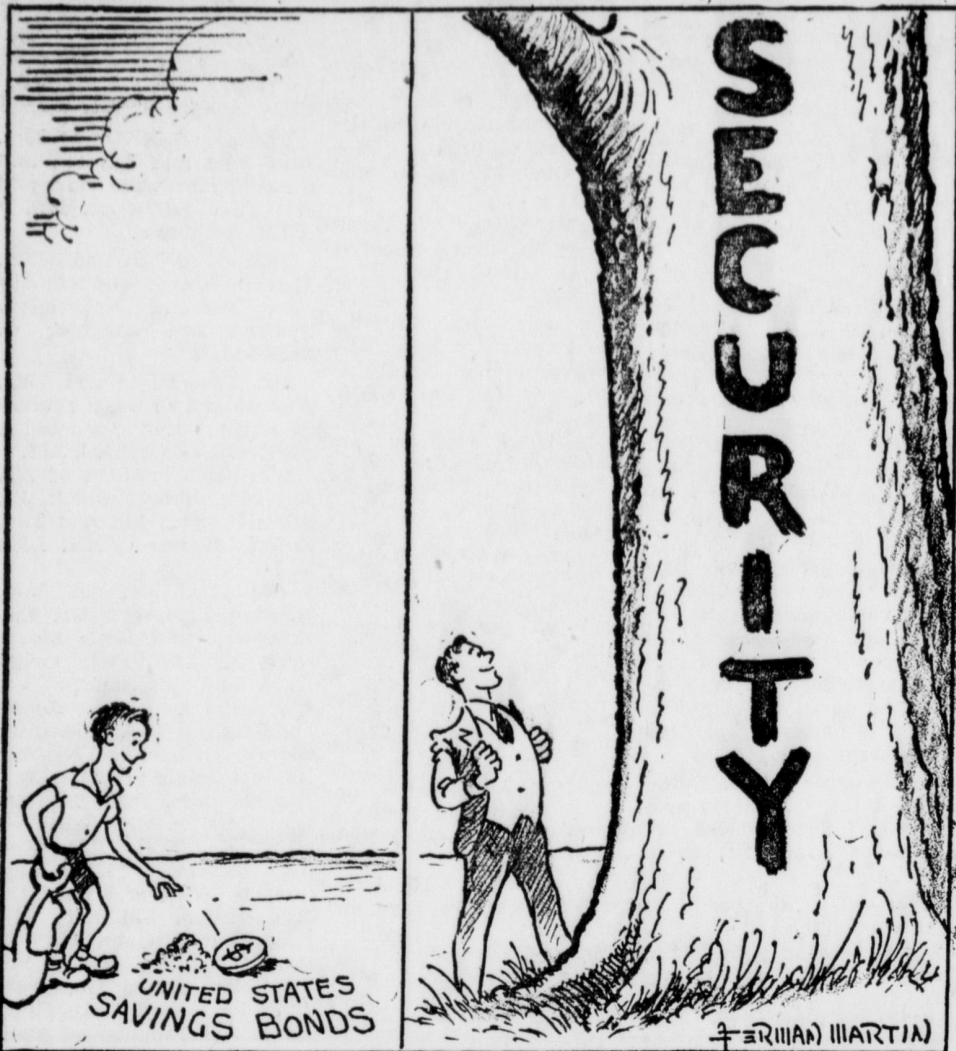


From Little Acorns

United Fund Sets Goal For 1957

The Lancaster County goal of the 1957 United Campaign has been set at \$841,806, it has been announced by the Joint Campaign Policy Committee of the Red Cross and the Community Chest. The United Drive, under the chairmanship of Richard J. Blakinger, will raise funds for 23 different health and welfare agencies including the 22 Red Feather Services of the Community Chest and Red Cross.

Opening on October 7 in the County and on October 14 in Lancaster City, it will close on November 1.

The Joint Campaign Policy Committee announced that the goal was reached after careful analysis of the agencies' estimated costs and income for next year. Agency budgets were reviewed by representatives of the community on the Chest Budget and on the Boards of the Chest and the Red Cross.

The committee stated that this year's goal is about \$12,000 more than was raised last year. The 1956 United Campaign received a total of \$829,689 in contributions toward a goal of \$840,431.

Contributors to the United Campaign are being asked for about the same measure of support this year as in 1956," Daniel Rhoads, Community Chest president, announced today. "Usually goals of the United Campaigns have to be increased from year to year to enable the Chest agencies and the Red Cross to meet rising operating costs and to improve their services. Budgets prepared by the agencies for 1958 were no exception and would have meant a substantially higher campaign goal had it not been for two offsetting factors. First, one of the Chest's agencies, the Rossmore Sanatorium, suspended operations this summer. Second, the Chest's Budget Committee, in a series of meetings with the other agencies, arrived at amounts to meet their combined needs that totalled about the same as the provision normally made for Rossmore. The net result was a goal of \$841,816 for the 1957 campaign, as compared with the goal of \$840,431 in the 1956 campaign."
