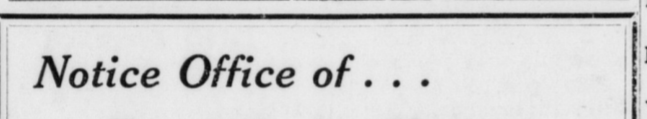

To live comfortably in the modern fashion, the minimum electrical capacity which a family must have is 100-ampere service entrance, with three wires conveying electrical power from the utility line in the street. If a doorway which leads to these areas.

M., E.D.S.T. the Elizabethtown and Mount Joy central offices and subscribers will be brought into the new nationwide 2 Letter-5 Figure Numbering System for dial offices. The new central office name for Elizabethtown telephones will be EMpire. The new central office name for Mount Joy telephones will be OLDfield.

Elizabethtown and Mount Joy subscribers, to make any call within your local calling area of both exchanges, simply dial the first two letters of the central office name, plus the present five figure number. Suppose, for example, you are at an EMpire telephone in Elizabethtown, and want to call a friend in Mount Joy whose OLDfield number is listed in the directory as 3-3901. Here's all you do:

1. Lift the receiver and listen for the dial tone . . .
2. Dial the Letter O . . . then the letter L . . .
3. Dial each of the five figures, 3-3901, in turn.

Please be sure to dial all seven, two letters and five figures, otherwise a wrong number will be reached, or none at all.

When making a toll call and the operator asks you for your number, please give her the complete number - the new central office name in addition to the present and calls to other neighboring points or Columbia, Marietta and Mountville subscribers, to make a call to Elizabethtown or Mount Joy, give the number to your "O" operator as usual, only precede the number with the new exchange name. For example, "I want to call Elizabethtown, EMpire 7-1234".

All free service or local calling areas, and calls to other neighboring points or long distance remain as before. Please tell people who call you from out of town to use the new central office name in addition to your present number. This new system is in preparation for future developments in the nationwide telephone toll system. Thank you for your cooperation.
