The 1957-58 school term will officially open in the schools of the Hempfield Joint School District with a general faculty meeting for all teachers scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 3 at 9:30 a.m. High school teachers will meet at the Hempfield high school, and all elementary teachers will meet at the Landisville elementary school.

Elementary students in the districts' five schools will report to their respective schools on Wednesday, Sept. 4, at 8:30 a.m. for a half-day session. Thursday will also be a half-day session during the same hours for elementary pupils. The first full day of classes will be on Friday, September 6. Kindergarten will not begin until Friday. In the high school, students in grades 9 through 12 only will report for enrollment on Wednesday, Sept. 4, at 8:30 a.m. Students in grades 7 and 8 only will report for enrollment at 8:30 on Thursday, Sept. 5, at 8:30 a.m. on each of these days. The first full day of classes will be on Friday, Sept. 6.

Walter H. Reese, supervisor of elementary education reports that there have been nine faculty additions in the district. New teachers in the Landisville elementary school are Miss Ruth N. Frantz, second grade; Miss Lois Ann Harkins, fourth grade; Miss Hazel I. Garner, fifth grade; Mrs. Helen P. Horst, fifth grade; and Miss Catherine M. Cuskey, sixth grade. Mrs. Audrey C. Drouit will teach grades 2 and 3 in the Mountville school, and Mrs. Annette Shindler will teach kindergarten in the Farmdale School. Mrs. Mary G. Emenheiser will teach at Rohrerstown, transferring from the Landisville Elementary School, and Miss Helen E. Sauder will teach elementary and junior high school vocal music.

In the Hempfield high school, seven new teachers will assume teaching duties. They are John P. Kershner, geography; Mrs. Flory S. Hiestand, English and French who is replacing Miss Helen E. Farren, now on sabbatical leave; Mrs. Mary E. Kline, high school English; Richard L. Kline, vocal music; Miss Marilyn E. Neff, girls health and physical education; Jarl L. Nohrenberg, junior high social studies; and William C. Piper, driver training.
