Labor's Share of U. S. Income Is on the Rise
In a feature article dealing with America's growth during the past decade, based upon the report by the President's Council of Economic Advisers, U. S. News and World Report points out the shift which has taken place in the distribution of the nation's income.
Labor's share has risen from 69.6 to 75.8 percent, while that of business proprietors and professional men has sagged from 11.8 to 8.8 percent, and that of farmers has declined from 7.7 to 3.5 percent.
