### Electric Assn. Marks 50th Anniversary

The Pennsylvania Electric Association marked its 50th anniversary of service at a Golden Anniversary meeting on Wednesday and Thursday, October 2 and 3, at the Bellevue-Stratford, Philadelphia. Over 700 representatives from Pennsylvania's 23 business-managed electric service companies attended the meeting. Keynote of the Convention was "50 Years of Progress . . . and the Road Ahead." Chas. E. Oakes, PP&L president, was one of three Pennsylvania electric company chief executives to address the group on Thursday. He discussed financing the industry's future, which includes a billion dollar expansion program for Pennsylvania electric companies over the next five years.

Featured speaker was J. Carlton Ward, Jr., chairman of the board of Vitro Corporation of America and organizer of the Aircraft Nuclear Propulsion program. Among the guest speakers was the Honorable Joseph Sharfstein of Philadelphia, a member of the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission.
