

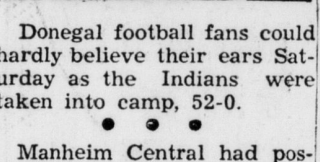
Jaycees To Sponsor Junior Bowling League For Local Kids

Not many days ago, after a sizeable party had been at the church, the contribution box was opened and included one \$20 bill and one \$50 bill.

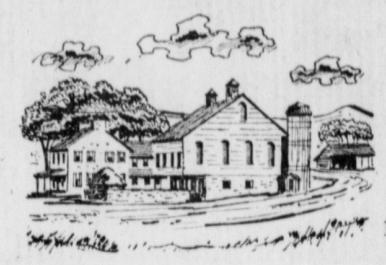

Board Sets Evening Policy

No evening classes will be held at Donegal high school during the first semester it was announced at the Thursday night meeting of the board. The preliminary registration showed that no class would have the required minimum of fifteen members. It is hoped that the Attorney General would make a ruling favorable to the school districts concerning state reimbursement, and if so, the board plans to hold classes during the second semester.

The board voted to apply to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the Federal government for funds to pay the cost of preparation of plans for necessary additions and renovations to schools in the Donegal area. These funds are loaned to school districts interest free, to be repaid when actual construction begins.

Dr. Richard Howell, Marietta, was appointed to the position of Dental Examiner of all the schools in the Donegal area. Wilbur I. Beam, supervising principal, reported that there are 1490 students in the elementary schools; 846 in the high school; making a total of 2,328 students with an average attendance of 98%.

The board agreed to cooperate with the agency handling the Jack and Jill Bus Shelters which will be placed at various points throughout the district. Board members reported that much interest is being shown in the meetings held to discuss the union school district story throughout the area.

Scheduled for this week were Monday at the Maytown Elementary School; Tuesday, Mount Joy Elementary School; Wednesday, Milton Grove Elementary School; and tonight at the Florin Washington Elementary school.

Bills amounting to \$116,277.36 were approved for payment. Jay C. Musser, president, was in charge of the meeting.

Voters To Elect Councilmen

Mount Joy voters in the west ward will decide who two members of borough council will be in the November 5 election.

Two men from a field of four will be elected. Two candidates are Democrat and two Republican. Endorsed in the primary election in May, the Democrat candidates are Charles Ashenfelter and William Dommel. The Republican candidates named in the spring primary are James Phillips and Simeon Horon. Dommel is seeking re-election but the other three are newcomers in the field.

In the east ward, one councilman will be elected but following the primary contest of the Republican party in May, there is only one candidate, George Groff. Aldus Hannan is the candidate for Burgess and Mrs. Dorothy Kipple, the candidate for tax collection.

Two school board members, Albert Seiler and Frank Walker, Jr. are both seeking re-election. Two will be elected. Although Hannan is the only candidate whose name will appear on the ballot for Burgess, James E. Hockenberry this week has announced that he also is seeking that office by write-in votes.

Other candidates whose names will be on the ballot are Arthur Moyer, auditor for the Republican party; John L. Schroll, judge of election and Christian Sherk, inspector of election for the Democratic party in the east ward with Cyrus Gainer for the Democratic party in the west ward with Walter Eshleman, judge of election and Burton Shupp, inspector of election for the Republican party.

In addition to voting for local officials, voters locally will ballot for or against school merger. Residents of the borough, Mt. Joy Township, Marietta Borough and East Donegal Township will vote on the union question.

LEINS ARE FILED

Leins were filed Monday on all properties located south of the railroad tracks whose front footage assessment fees have not been paid. The owners had previously been given both a deadline and an extension to have the sewage assessment paid. Under the lein system, the owner is charged with the costs of filing the leins, a five per cent penalty and 6 per cent interest per year.

These seventeen liens were the first ever to be filed by a municipal authority in the county. They range from \$215 to \$3,700.

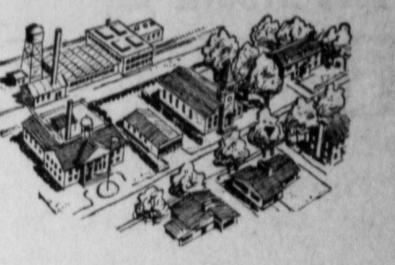
Fills New Job At Armstrong

No Solution Found For Stauffertown

About fifty persons attended a special meeting for residents of Stauffertown Tuesday evening in the local Fire House. The meeting, called to order by Jay Sherk, Jr., was turned over to the group's lawyer, Alexander Stein, of Lancaster.

Mr. Stein reviewed the situation to date but was unable to supply any concrete ideas for a solution. No copies of reports on tests made by the two pipe line companies and the Public Utility Commission were available. Neither the residents of the area nor their attorney have been given copies of the tests or the meetings of the groups which were held in Lancaster. Manufacturers Light and Heat Company, Southern Pipeline Company, the PUC and the State Police representatives met in special meetings recently but none of the firms or the state group released copies to the residents or to their attorney.

Paul Z. Knier, county fire marshal, and Jacob Weber, president of the county firemen's association were also present and spoke briefly to the group. As the meeting closed, no solutions were announced nor any new approaches announced whereby the problem might be solved.

Trick Or Treat By Church Group

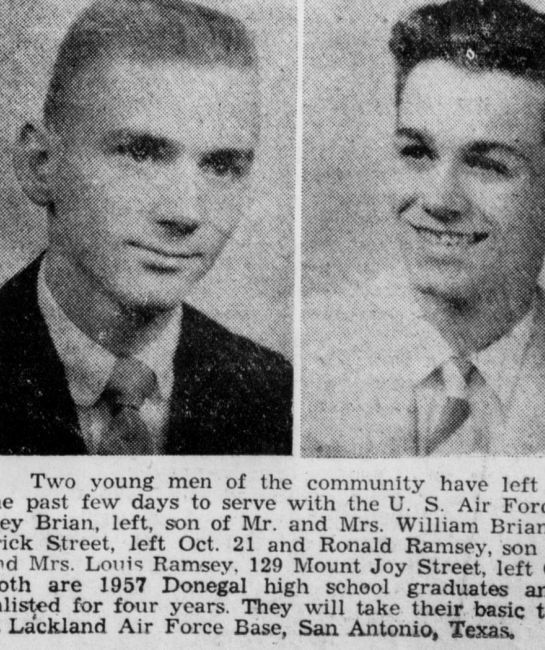
