Landisville - Salunga

A Halloween parade will be held in Landisville on Saturday, Oct. 26, sponsored by the Landisville Elementary School Parent-Teachers Association and scheduled to begin at 3:45 p.m. Some of the marching units in the annual parade will be the Hempfield high school band, Boy and Girl Scouts from the Landisville area, and the school children in costume. The Landisville-Salunga Area Junior Chamber of Commerce will enter a float, and both the Landisville and Salunga fire companies and equipment will participate.

One of the highlights of the parade will be the naming of a Halloween Queen and her court. Candidates for the youthful queen will be from each of the four sixth grade classes at the Landisville elementary school. 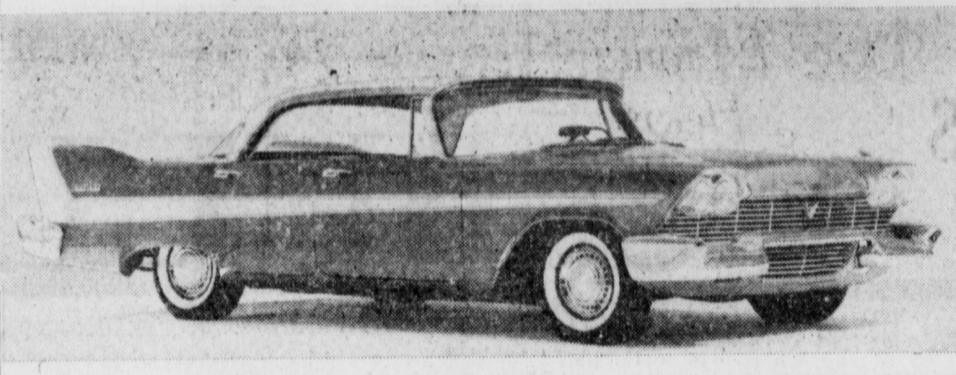

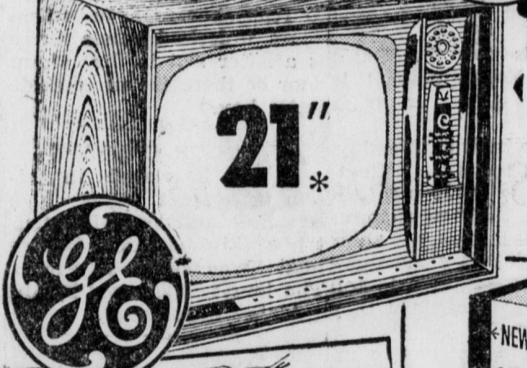
