Basketball Time

Rules Changes for '57-58

To give fans a better understanding of the game, as it is to be played this season, some of the several new rules changes are noted below.

Players numbers - Teams which procure new uniforms must use numbers with no digit greater than five, either used singly or in combination. All teams must conform by the 1960-61 season.

Double fouls - No free throws shall be awarded for a double foul. Each player will be charged with a "personal" foul and the ball tossed up at center.

Ball over backboard - A ball passing over the backboard (rectangular) shall be ruled out of bounds. If on a throw-in the ball is thrown from behind the plane of the backboard and it comes down in front of the plane, it is a violation by the thrower.

Throw-in from free-throw lane extended - The rule prohibiting a throw-in inside the free throw lines extended is deleted.

Return to back court - Further restriction gives first player to touch ball after a jump ball a legal return only if the jump ball is in the center circle.

Basket interference - Players of NEITHER team may touch the ball or basket while the ball is in the cylinder above the basket. This applies to field goal shots, free tosses or rebounds (unless it is obvious the ball will not go into the basket). "Dunking" shots, however, are not prohibited.

Delaying tactics - It is provided that when a team is behind or while on the defense with the score tied and after a warning by the referee, that team is responsible for providing game action. Or, if the opponents have the ball, the team behind must be reasonably active in its efforts to procure the ball. If the ball is disregarded, a technical foul shall be called. One warning applies to the remainder of that period.

Common foul penalties - Until after the administering of a penalty for the first four personal fouls in each half by a given team, only one free throw shall be awarded. After four penalties, each foul shall carry a "one and one" or bonus free throw. Extra periods are part of the second half.

The National Basketball Rules Committee makes the following observations which fans, officials, players and coaches should understand: 1. The 5-second held ball rule should be more rigidly enforced. 2. Laxity in enforcing rules against coaching from the sidelines when there is no timeout is bad; 3. Varied interpretations about responsibility when an opponent runs under a jump shooter or a shooter charging into a guard is causing uncertainty in players. 4. Failure to award two free throws for intentional fouls tends to encourage ragged play during the closing minutes. 5. Loose enforcement prohibiting a foot across the line before the ball touches the ring or backboard is nullifying benefits of the wide freethrow lane. 6. Negligence of a player concerning raising his hand after he has been charged with a foul or raising his hand in disrespectful gesture is having a bad effect on crowd reaction.

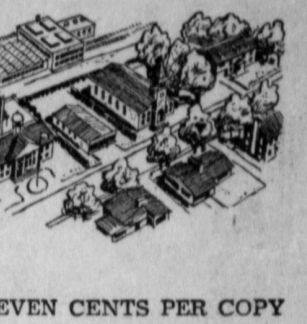

Attorney Answers Questions Concerning Union Plans For School

William Arnold, solicitor for the Donegal Area Joint School Board, attended the recent meeting of the board and answered many questions concerning the transition from a joint to a union district.

Some of the questions and answers are - 1. The union district will become official July 1, 1958; 2. The twenty of the most populous districts in 1961, the term of two directors from each board expires. At this election one member will be elected from each of the two districts; 3. All assets, one member at large. In 1963 such as unpaid taxes, unpaid appropriation, real estate, etc. will have terms expiring and will become the property of the union district and all liabilities such as bonded indebtedness, temporary loans, un-

53 must be completed by the individual boards. Reports of and other business of the year 1957-58 remain the responsibility of the individual boards.

In other business transacted at the meeting, bills in the amount of \$14,647.89 were approved for payment. The board heard a report on the method of paying bus contractors as outlined by the Department of Public Instruction. In order to secure maximum reimbursement on transportation, it is necessary that this method be used in computing payment for the Donegal bus contractors. The amount of these contracts is \$31,626.00.

Wilbur I. Beahm, supervising principal, reported a total enrollment of 2,314 students and 841 high school students. The board decided to give a second flu shot to all employees on the recommendation of the school medical examiner.

Word was received from the department of Public Instruction that complete results of the financial audit of the high school building will result in an additional payment of rental for the years 1952-57 of approximately \$22,000.

On the recommendation of Thomas Malin, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, the board decided to authorize the formation of an adult farmer class in voc. agriculture if there is sufficient interest for an enrollment of from 10 to 20 people.

The Pennsylvania Power & Light Company showed a film concerning the renovation of school buildings. The next regular meeting of the joint board will be held Dec. 19. A dinner will be held in the high school cafeteria to honor retiring members. The board will meet to reorganize and new members will present their credentials and take office. Jay Musser, president, was in charge of the meeting.
