**Jaycees To Purchase Uniform**

Mount Joy Jaycees voted \$125 toward the purchase of a policewoman's uniform at the Tuesday night meeting of the group, Burgess Aldus, Hannan, who is also chair-  
man of the committee for the project, was present at the meeting to discuss the need of policewomen in the borough to assist at street crossings where school children go to and from school.

Two projects were endorsed for the coming spring months: Youth Day in Government at Donegal High school and a Bicycle Road-race for younger youth. Ragner Hallgren was named chairman of the Youth Day project. In other appointments, Richard Kepple was named chairman of a sign committee to investigate signs to be placed at the entrances of the borough. Henry Zerphoy was named chairman of a special rear license plate committee, and John Stauffer was named director on the board to fill a vacancy.

Three new members were accepted into the chapter: Baxter Wells, East Main St., Leonard Saffo, East Main St., and William Arnold, Maytown. John Landis, secretary conducted the initiation of three members recently accepted into the group, John Wolgemuth, Jere Henderson and Mr. Arnold. The member-

ship now stands at 81 in comparison to 23 members last spring.

The chapter-sponsored Junior Bowling league will complete its first season March 29. The men voted to stage a banquet for all the bowlers who competed in two-thirds or more of the Saturday morning activity. Park Neiss was named chairman of the project. There are approximately 42 teenage boys in the league.

In other business the group announced it will be host to the Red Rose meeting of the county chapters at the local American Legion home Jan. 29. The headquarters building on East Main Street has been completed in both exterior and interior renovations. The men also endorsed the building of a Pennsylvania State headquarters building. George Albert, president, was in charge of the meeting.
