CONTRACT FOR BRUNNER ISLAND

One of the final business transactions made in 1957 was the awarding of the contract for clearing and grading the site of P.P.&L.'s new Brunner Island power plant to Kimbob, Inc., of Harrisburg, Pa., according to Chas. E. Oakes, P.P.&L. Chairman of the Board.

The contract calls for the removal of brush and timber from that area of the new site where the first unit of the big new plant will be constructed. Located about 15 miles below Harrisburg on the Susquehanna river, the initial unit is expected to cost about \$48 million and will have an expected capacity of 330,000 Kw.

Following brush and timber clearance approximately 15 feet of earth fill will be spread over the entire operating area in order to raise the ground level three feet above the 1936 flood level, highest in history. This will involve moving about 1,600,000 cubic yards of soil with giant earth-moving equipment.

Plans for a new senior high school at Landisville were discussed Monday night at a meeting of the Hempfield Joint School Board at Hempfield high school. The action is a result of the rapid growth of the student population which is making the present junior-senior high school all but bursting at the seams. The present building, which is only in its third year of use since its completion in 1955, will be used for a junior high school upon completion of the proposed new building. The new building will serve the students in grades 10, 11 and 12. Members of the board indicated that the need for increased space was realized when the present building was conceived, but that the Department of Public Instruction would not approve building plans based on expected school enrollments beyond six years.

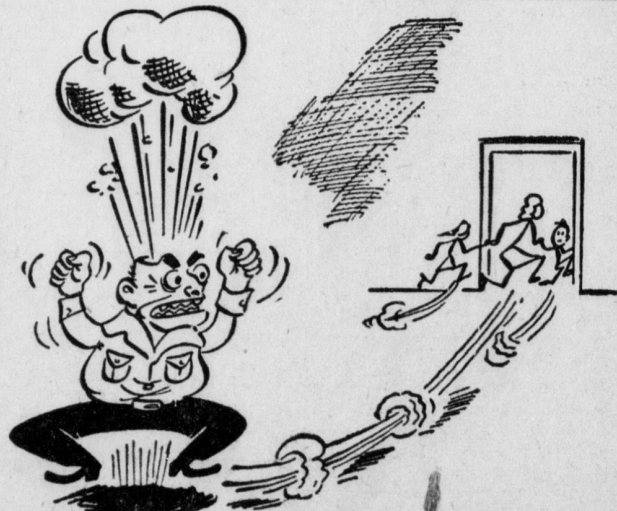
The new building will be built somewhere on the present tract of land in Landisville. Co's can be cut since facilities like the gymnasium and auditorium in the present building can be shared.

In other business, the joint school board accepted the resignation of Miss Elizabeth H. Bick as dietitian, to be effective at the end of the present school term. The meeting of the school officials was presided over by J. Richard Nissley, president of the joint board.

Rotary Hears Of New Tax Value Program

How the re-assessment of Lancaster county property will be accomplished was told Mount Joy Rotarians Tuesday noon by Herbert Wagaman, county commissioner.

The program, which is called "assessment equalization" has been mandated by the state to attempt to more fairly distribute the tax load among the property owning citizens, he said.

Certain regulations are imposed to prevent a use of the reevaluation to hike taxes.

Field workers are expected to be at work by about April 1 to begin viewing property and setting value figures. Some 100,000 to 110,000 pieces of property will be inspected, he said. However, it is probable that the system of fixing taxes can not be placed into full operation until 1961, he said.

The speaker was introduced by Earl Koser, Rotary program chairman.

Holsteins Make Lactation Test

The Holstein-Friesian Association of America reports the completion of new lactation averages by the registered Holstein herds of A. W. Wickenheiser of Mount Joy and M. M. Wenger of Rhems.

Lactation averages are calculated on the two-milkings a day, 305 days, mature equivalent basis commonly employed to provide a uniform basis for comparisons and selections in registered Holstein breeding programs.

Wickenheiser's 29 cows averaged 13,590 pounds of milk with an average of 493 lbs. of butterfat while Wenger's 32 head of cattle averaged 13,456 pounds of milk and 499 pounds of fat.

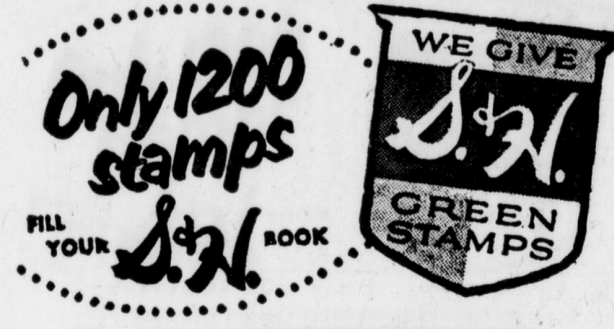
