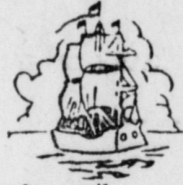

Teachers' Training
 Professor Joseph R. Hollinger, Landisville, professor of Mathematics at Franklin and Marshall College, was the guest speaker at the first of a series of in-service training programs for teachers held at the Hempfield High School last Monday and for the Hempfield faculty. Professor Hollinger spoke on the changes which have taken place in the academic mathematics field at college & universities brought about by recent scientific developments and the opening of new fields of study in mathematics. He followed through with comments on what it will mean to school program of mathematics, and mentioned trends in revising the course of study, in that subject in high schools.

The Mathematics Department at Hempfield high school recently received national recognition when a charter was granted them by Mu Alpha Theta, National high school Mathematics Club. Membership in the club is restricted to junior and senior class members who have successfully completed algebra I and plane geometry, and who are continuing study in academic mathematics, and who have maintained at least a B-plus average in those subjects and a B average in their general school work.
