The Hempfield Junior High School Basketball team was in the spotlight last week in establishing what no doubt is a record in Lancaster County schoolboy basketball. They held Marheim Central scoreless in three periods of play and only permitted them one successful foul shot in the final period to end the game on the long end of a 54-1 count. The junior high squad is on top of the county league with five wins and no losses in league play, and are also victor in four non-league tilts. They have a one-week lay-over before they meet Elizabethtown on February 7 at 7 p. m.

The junior varsity and varsity teams at Landisville also posted victories over Marheim Central last Friday night. The Jayvees, coached by Dick McDiarmid, held a comfortable lead throughout the game and won, 39-22. The varsity, ahead 37-27 at the half, exploded in the third and fourth quarters to tag the Barons with a 71-41 defeat. UC Nearing Peril Point

Could Bring Tax Hike on January 1

Pennsylvania employers face the prospect of a possible boost in the payroll tax from an average 1.5 per cent to 2.2 per cent on Jan. 1.

The Bureau of Employment Security has reported that the increase may be necessary under the jobless benefits law because of heavy drains on the fund. Director John F. Adams said the fund balance was \$361,700,000 at the start of December and that there is "no sign of any improvement in the labor market."

Under the Unemployment Compensation Law when the fund balance drops below 350 million dollars increased payroll taxes go into effect automatically.

'Touch and Go'
"It appears to be touch-and-go at the moment," Adams said. "And it might take us up to Dec. 28 before we really know the answer."

Unemployment compensation claims now are running nearly 50 per cent ahead of this time a year ago. There were 168,245 claims for the week of Nov. 22, amounting to payments of \$4,658,003 in benefits.

The number of claims was 58,500 more than those for the same week in 1956.

Money Alone Not Defense Answer, Swigert Warns

More expenditure of more money isn't the answer to satellite development or other defense problems, according to Ernest G. Swigert, outgoing president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Commenting on Vice President Nixon's recent statement that defense needs take precedence over tax relief, Mr. Swigert said "all true Americans will agree with Mr. Nixon that the necessity of maintaining our military superiority must always take priority over our desire for tax reduction."

Won't Short-Change Defense
"The National Association of Manufacturers, on behalf of American industry," Mr. Swigert said, "pledges that it will seek no tax cuts which will short-change the nation's defense needs. The kind of tax reduction we advocate is the kind which would bolster our defenses by strengthening our economy and allowing us to expand and progress economically without inflation. There are many Federal expenditures in the non-defense category which can and should be curtailed or postponed so that both our defenses and our economy can be kept strong."

"However, we must not fall into the error of supposing that every problem in national defense can be solved merely by the expenditure of more money. The reason the Soviets were first with a space satellite is not because our own efforts in the rocket field have been hampered by a shortage of funds. President Eisenhower has stated that not one nickel ever has been loaned for rocket development and Congress has voted very requested appropriation in full."

Must Not Pring Stampede
"The Russian moon must not be allowed to stampede the nation into 'crash' appropriations for rocket research which would be wasteful and add little or nothing to our progress, but which would force us to deny the orderly reduction of tax rates so long overdue and which the economy needs if it is to remain strong and healthy."
