Replies by 24% of the 18,000 manufacturers to whom an N. A. M. questionnaire had been mailed gave these percentages in predictions for their own companies for 1958:

> Up Same Down 33 Profits . Expansion 19

To a question about the principal barriers to expansion in their own industries, 22 per cent of the manufacturers cited taxation. Increased costs were listed by 22 per cent; business uncertainty 21; tight credit 13; union demands, 10.

As to the greatest problems facing American business as a whole, taxation was set forth by 22.4 per cent; labor, 21.7, business trends, 11.2 and costs, 9.3.
