Americans must reverse the trend toward complete government control or submit to "absolute regimentation of their daily lives," according to Ernest G. Swigert, board chairman of the National Association of Manufacturers.

"The time may come when we will be unable to choose our own careers, change jobs, start a business, or buy or sell property, take out a mortgage, move from place to place, borrow money, or even send our children to college without getting permission from some government bureaucrat," Mr. Swigert warned recently.

"This will surely happen unless every one of us as a citizen is alert to restore our fundamental principles to full vigor; unless we are determined to preserve the substance as well as the forms of representative government."

Dangerous Drift
The dangerous drift from the basic principles of the republic laid down by the founding fathers, Mr. Swigert pointed out, has been spurred by national indifference in four major areas.

"First, we have permitted and even encouraged the low withering away of local and state authority and responsibility and the concentration of increasing power and control in Washington.

"Second, we have witnessed, with apparent indifference, the breakdown of the doctrine of separation of powers between equal and coordinate branches of the national government. It can no longer be truthfully said that Congress alone makes the laws and controls the nation's

purse. More and more, control over law-making and the effective authority to spend the people's money becomes lodged in the hands of the Executive Branch and the bureaucracy."

Submission to Rule
Mr. Swigert said that a third way in which the drift has been marked is through submission to rule by administrative agencies of the government. He asserted that the huge bureaucracy "which has spread like an Asian flu epidemic" interprets the laws and issues the regulations and that these are often in sharp conflict with the intent and will of Congress.

"A fourth way is by allowing the Supreme Court—traditionally our final bulwark against erosion of the Constitution—to be distorted into an instrument of social change rather than of calm, cool legal determination."

NAM Forcast: Sales Up, Profits Steady

Sales in 1958 should equal or excel those of 1957, but profits are more likely to hold steady or even squeeze downward, the National Association of Manufacturers reports.

Reversing recent trends, there is a possibility that capital outlays for expansion may drop slightly, according to a survey covering 4,330 manufacturing companies.


Replies by 24% of the 18,000 manufacturers to whom an N. A. M. questionnaire had been mailed gave these percentages in predictions for their own companies for 1958:

	Up	Same	Down
Sales	36	45	19
Profits	22	45	33
Expansion	19	55	26

To a question about the principal barriers to expansion in their own industries, 22 per cent of the manufacturers cited taxation. Increased costs were listed by 22 per cent; business uncertainty 21; tight credit 13; union demands, 10.

As to the greatest problems facing American business as a whole, taxation was set forth by 22.4 per cent; labor, 21.7; business trends, 11.2 and costs, 9.3.
