## Pharmacy Opens In Landisville

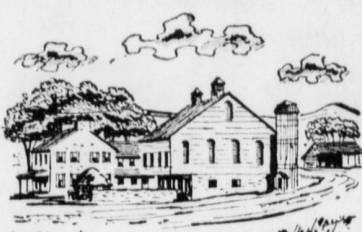

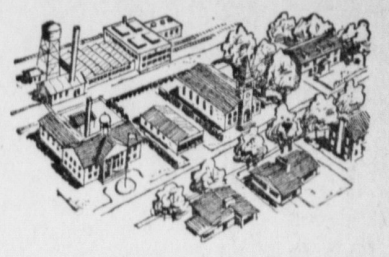

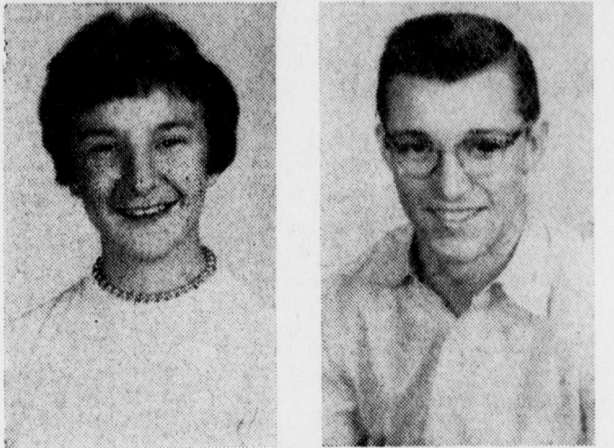
