



To try to pull the loose ends of last week's storm together at this distance would be like trying to make order and system out of spaghetti and meat balls.

Mount Joy, like the rest of the area, was given a terrific beating by the heavy snow. However, other than the electric and telephone wires, most of the damage was confined to downed limbs, sagging clothes lines, and a cracked ridge pole here and there.

Damage to the roof of the foundry of the Grey Iron Casting company was probably the largest single piece of damage.

But, when you begin to talk about the electric and telephone situation you open one of the biggest books of personal experience written in this section. This week there is no topic of conversation more universally followed than a discussion of the way each family and business organization surmounted its problems of functioning without electricity.

It seems safe to say that the market is dead ripe for the sale of auxiliary power units in this area. One man told us this week that price was no particular item and he doesn't care whether he uses the unit for another 10 years. He's going to buy an outfit at once.

Maybe you'd like to know something of the cost. We looked it up in some material last Saturday afternoon. A small 110-volt outfit, complete with gasoline motor and generator, can be had for something a little less than \$100. Bigger outfits upward in easy steps to "what do you want to pay?"

People milked cows who had not done the job for 20 years. Others were given their first lessons. Even some old cows had their first full milking by hand.

Hardware and variety stores in Mount Joy sold every kind of heating and lighting device in stock connections. Camp stoves came out of storage and flashlights were as welcome as were candles.

Meals were cooked in fireplaces and entire houses were warmed by the meager heat of fireplaces which were built as a pleasant luxury.

About every kind of an emergency imaginable happened and was overcome as imagination, patience and necessity combined to take care of the situation. However, the two most valuable traits of human nature displayed were the love of adventure and good nature.

Here at the Bulletin, by sheer good fortune the paper last week was in the advanced stage of being assembled when power failed a few minutes after 8 a.m. By using hand methods, by leaving out material scheduled for publication and by good luck the big press was ready to roll at noon as power was re-established.

While it is hard to be patient when there is no electricity in the wires, at least a word of praise should be given the P.P. & L. workers and the Columbia Telephone men.

To get an idea of the horrible, horrible mess in which these people found themselves and in which they still are struggling, just take a drive down any road leading into Mount Joy. Don't criticize, just be glad you weren't inconvenienced any more than you were and that the extra cost of survival was not greater.

We are compelled to say that we just don't like these "old fashioned" winters when we are obliged to fight them with modern conveniences.

C. of C. To Erect Road Signs


Two, fine, new signs at the entrances to Mount Joy will be erected along Highway 230, it was announced this week by the Chamber of Commerce.
