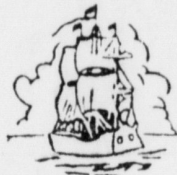

The board voted in favor of participation in the establishment of an Area Technical School under direction of the county board, W. I. Beahm, supervising principal, reported an enrollment of 1477 elementary students and 809 high school students for a total of 2286. As of May 1, 1958, the percentage of attendance was 96%.
