Nylon Carpets Easy To Clean

For best results in treating spots and stains on nylon carpet, act promptly and quickly. Such immediate care can save time and trouble. Points out Doris L. Snook, home management extension specialist of the Pennsylvania State University.

Scrape, blot, or soak up the spill with tissue, clean cloths, or a sponge. Work from the edges toward the center of the spill so you don't spread the stain. In many cases, a diluted detergent solution will do the trick. When stains are of an oily or greasy type, use a household spot remover or dry cleaning solvent.
