Authority Member Boils Over— Plays Editor and Boro Council

Letters To The Editor

Sir: The underhanded attack on the Boro Authority by various persons in the community culminated in your "musings" noted in the issue of July 10. For some reason the Authority has been the butt of snide remarks and deprecatory statements hurled haphazardly and with no foundation for the past year. The attacks have been made by persons who know not whereof they speak, and do not have the courage to appear at the regular meetings to air for intelligent discussion their inane carping. In the forefront of this group can be easily located you and the members of Boro Council.

The reason for this treatment is not discernible. As you and Council well know the present Authority was handed a herculean task and all but one of the members were totally unfamiliar with the job at hand. In spite of this all members pitched in, spent much time bringing themselves up to date on the operation, and have just about completed the task to the best interests of the town as a whole, as well as any group could have, if not better, for your Authority has the intestinal fortitude to perform its duties conscientiously and in a straightforward manner in spite of the petty bickering and name calling to which it is subjected. And this distinction is one not shared with other public bodies in the Boro.

May I suggest that the situation might well be improved should you find time to attend the Authority meetings and print factual accounts of the business transacted thereat, instead of your usual garbled accounts. I don't believe a meeting has been held in this period of time of which I speak that you have accurately stated the results of the Authority's meetings. In the very short item on the most recent meeting you have erred in your account of the office closing for two weeks in July.

Permit me to refute your most recent fantasy — "The Boro Authority is too far removed from the people and is not approachable." The Authority maintains an office in the Boro Hall open Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Saturday morning; two operators are on duty every day each installation (water and sewer plants); each of the three aforementioned locations is listed in the telephone directory; two members of the Authority

are present in the office every Saturday morning; the Authority holds meetings open to the public every month (where a tremendous amount of business is transacted and many citizens have been heard and their problems amicably settled); and on top of all this the members of the Authority, and more particularly the Chairman, are "approached" in person and by telephone at all hours of the day or night. And all this on a voluntary basis by the members. I know of no other political subdivision in the community that can boast of such constant service to the townspeople. Unapproachable, you say!

Mount Joy needs a boro manager, you state, and the Boro Authority agrees wholeheartedly with you. But the first step in attaining that end will be to get Council to pull its collective head out of the sand and face its duties realistically. For example, just recently the Authority hired a new engineer and the suggestion was made that Council and the Authority collaborate on the hiring of an engineer who could serve both groups and perhaps effect some savings. Two joint meetings were called and in neither meeting was even one member of Council present, although the Burgess and several members of the Authority traveled many

4 miles to be present for discussion of such a worthwhile project.

To avoid name calling, but to state facts simply, mistakes of the past that go beyond even the creation of the Boro Authority have arisen like ghosts to plague the present members of the Authority and have placed the task of managing the operations in the difficult class. From present income provision must be made to finance annual operations, set up reserves, meet the terms of both the water and sewer indentures as to interest and retirement of indentures as to interest and retirement of funded debt, and for expansion of the systems. All this, should you acquaint yourself with the facts, is nothing to be taken lightly, and constant ill-founded sniping does not make the job any
