Predict Eggs Of Tomorrow Of Uniform Size

"The Egg Layer of the Future" will be as uniform as if machine produced, declared Max M. Brender, prominent poultry breeder from Ferndale, N. Y., during the 12th annual Poultry Breeders Conference at the Pennsylvania State University.

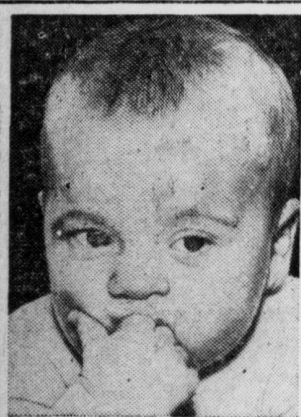
Discussing the future for poultry breeding, Brender said the hen of tomorrow will be a cross between a number of pure strains. She will be a healthy, vigorous, strain-cross-hybrid, he predicted. The strain-cross-hybrid is here to stay—unless a "mutation" or "sport" pop up to out-perform the hybrid, he added.

"The egg size of the future will begin close to large eggs and remain large through the laying life of the birds," Brender claimed. "Under good management and nutrition practices, fertility and hatchability will approach 100 per cent. The efficient, economical hen of the future will weigh somewhere around 4 to 4½ lbs. at maturity," he continued.

Tomorrow's freshly-laid egg will be high AA, it was pointed out. Quality eggs will be free of blood and meat spots and will be encased in smooth, hard shells. Nutrition will play an important part, and will also provide a uniform-colored egg yolk.

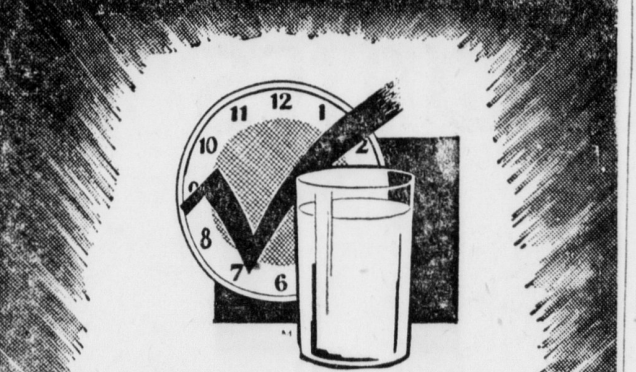

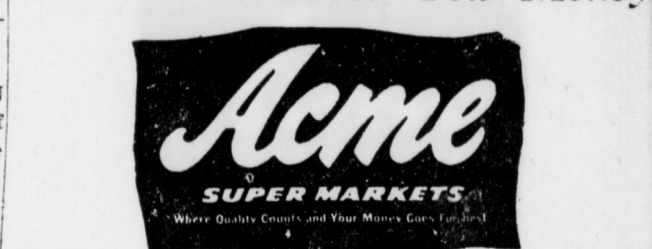
