



## Hey, Kids, It's Back To School List Information Needed For School Opening

Those interested in the history of Mount Joy will be particularly interested in a bit of carved limestone now in the office of the Mount Joy Mutual Insurance Company.

The stone recently was taken from the old house on the banks of Little Chiques creek — recognized as "the oldest house in Mount Joy." At the time of the recent centennial, it was rather certainly determined that the house, located on the land of the Joy Development company, was the oldest home standing at that time.

Last winter the house was bought by Richard Nissley of Landisville and is being taken down. From Nissley, Henry Carpenter acquired the block as a "loan" to place in his growing museum.

But, one of the interesting features of the situation is that, as well as has been established, the name stone is today lying in what is now the oldest house in Mount Joy.

Apparently Carpenter's home, at the corner of Main and Delta streets, now takes the title of "oldest." And there in the conservatory for inspection is the name stone from the former "oldest."

Although a venerable structure, the corner building of the three from which Mt. Joy Mutual operates has had loving care. The exterior has been well cared for and the interior has become a treasure house. In addition to housing interesting pieces of all kinds, it is the busy, efficient office of a growing business.

The inscription on the stone says, "Er Baue Von Jacob Stauer and Veronica Stauer in Anno 1785." There seems to be a bit of doubt as to the correctness of the German and Latin language mixture, but it is certain that the stone was erected in 1785.

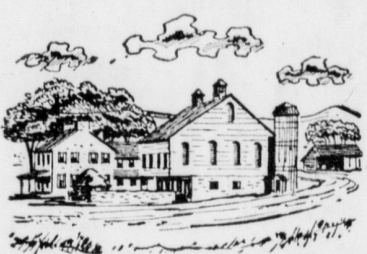
At present, plans call for creation of one big exhibit tent and the use of another tent for livestock. However, final decision is slated for next weekend when chairmen will review the situation.

In addition to tents, other exhibition space is to be made available in garages and buildings in the area around the old Pennsylvania railroad station and along Henry street.

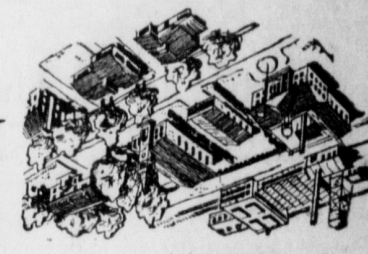
## MEETING CHANGED
