## Improvements Continue At Little Chiques Park

Improvements are continuing to make the Little Chiques Park a better park. During the past two weeks, 1,200 truck loads of fill were hauled into the park to fill in the "low areas". Six trucks worked on the project bringing in 100 loads per day.

Primarily the fill was used in four swamp areas, between the one pavilion and the creek at the eastern end of the peninsula; the area to the right of the park near the parallel bars; to the right of the basketball court and near the restrooms. In addition to having the swamp areas removed, mosquitoes will be eliminated. Although the project was completed last week, the heavy rainfall created several additional low spots in the areas. These spots were filled in with 100

loads Tuesday.

**More Parking**  
More parking area has been developed at the park. The present parking area inside the gate has been widened for more auto parking. Outside the gate, stones were placed along both sides of the entrance for parking facilities.

Further additions to the parking plot within the park will be made in the future whenever more fill is added. Persons wishing to get rid of any fill may seek permission to place it to the right of the present parking lot.

**To Encourage Wild Life**  
Eight winter feeders have been erected within the park and three more will be erected on the opposite side of the creek. Ear corn will be used in the feeders during the winter to attract wild life. In addition to these eight, one hollow tree stump is being used as a feeder near the "Grove" and a upright feeder built by Frank Germer is in use on the south side of the park.

Four new Mallard ducks may be seen in the creek at the park. A concrete squirrel has been placed on the oak tree between the first two pavilions on the north side of the entrance.

**More Equipment**  
Six more tables and benches will be placed within the park by the end of September. Also ten more concrete and wooden benches will be in the park by that time. Two of these new benches are already installed along the driveway.

This fall trees will be planted along the creek line and new trees will also be planted where the fill was added to the park.

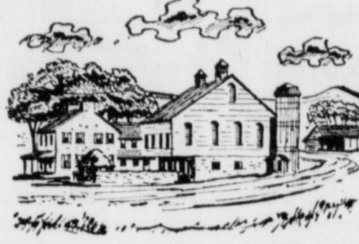
**New Areas**  
The four acres of land on the opposite side of the park will become a bird and animal sanctuary. The land will be posted this fall to protect the wild life living there.

An area for small children to swim was also created. In the creek along the north side of the park a spot was set aside where the water is less than "knee deep". Tens of sand was placed along the shore of the area.

Attendance at the park was greater than any other year of its existence. This year many persons who live in nearby communities made use of the local park. Funds for the improvement of the park owned by the school board were made possible through the SICO Company.

### Mount Joy Trucker Dies In Crash; Son Badly Hurt

Paul Shaffner, Mount Joy R1, was fatally injured in a two-truck collision Monday near Carlisle. His 8-year-old son was seriously injured. State police said his truck collided head-on with a truck driven by George E. Rebick, 28, Export, Pa., on Route 11, west of Harrisburg, near Carlisle.

Mr. Shaffner was burned beyond recognition, police said, when his truck, owned by C. E. Findley and Sons, Harrisburg Pike, caught fire. Passing motorists helped pull the Shaffner boy out of the truck cab, but they were unable to rescue his father.

Shaffner was driving a truck which left the Florin receiving station loaded with 300 bushels of tomatoes at 8 p.m. Monday. He was headed for the H. J. Heinz processing plant in Chambersburg when the accident occurred. Shaffner had been driving for Findley for about two weeks.

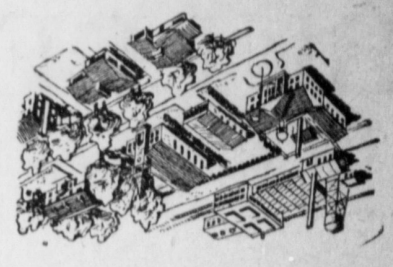

Open season includes first and last dates listed, Sundays excepted, for game. The opening hour for small game, migratory birds and other wild birds or animals on October 25 will be 8:00 A. M. EST. On other opening days, and otherwise during the season for upland and big game, the shooting hours daily are from 7:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M., EST, except from July 1 to September 30 inclusive, 6:00 A. M. to 7:30 P. M., EST, and the hours for the October archers' deer season, which are 6:00 A. M. to 5:30 P. M. EST. (FEDERAL REGULATIONS FOR SEASONS, BAG LIMITS AND GENERAL SHOOTING HOURS ON MIGRATORY GAME BIRDS WILL BE ANNOUNCED LATER.)
