6 children and adults received 18 free and part-pay clinic visits at the Lancaster Guidance Clinic.

2 adults use the facilities as members of the Jewish Community Center.

116 Boy Scouts with 50 adults, belong to the Lancaster County Scout Council.

Dall Attention To Hazard To Linemen

In an effort to end a serious hazard to linemen, Pennsylvania Power & Light Co. is asking public cooperation toward elimination of the dangerous and unlawful practice of posting placards on service poles.

The utility is appealing for public understanding of the dangers to linemen that result from nailing or tacking posters to poles.

Vice president G. T. Storb pointed out that the posters themselves are not harmful, but the nails and tacks used to fasten them to poles can result in serious injury. After the posters have been torn down or blown away, the metal fasteners remain. When a lineman's climbing hook, not designed to penetrate metal and used only on wood poles, strikes the nail or tack, it "cuts loose." The lineman, deprived of support, comes crashing downward and is torn or ripped by other nails and tacks. In some cases, he crashes to the ground and sustains broken bones, bruises or other painful injury.

The utility executive stated that accidents of this nature happen frequently because many persons who tack posters to poles simply are not aware of the possible results. In addition, the public is generally unaware that, for the past several years, the practice has been prohibited in this state under P.L. Act #360. However, PP&L feels that public understanding of the dangers involved to human life and limb will be "the important factor" in eliminating this hazardous practice.
