P. P. & L. Gives Simulated Tour

Members of the Maytown-Bainbridge Rotary Club were taken on a simulated tour of Pennsylvania Power & Light Co.'s Brunner Island Power Plant site Thursday night, Nov. 20, at their regular meeting when Willard U. Baum P.P.&L. system planning engineer reported on construction progress.

Baum pointed out that there are numerous factors to consider in determining the location for a new plant including the balance of existing generating stations, tie-in with our transmission line net work and load concentration. At Brunner Island, the cost of transporting coal to the plant can be held to a minimum.

He emphasized that economy is the watchword in the planning and construction of any power plant. The very design of this plant itself reflects an accomplishment in this direction in that it will be of outdoor type design.

In this, major equipment such as the turbine generator, steam generator, draft fans, dust precipitators and coal bunkers all will be outdoors," he said. "This is of real interest to the customer for when we do a job for less cost, there are less costs to pass on to the customer in rates charged for service".

TWELVE ATTEND CEREMONY

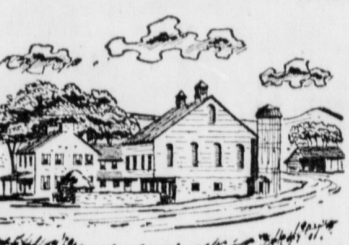

Christmas Lights In Mount Joy To Make Appearance Soon

Mount Joy's Main Street will take on a new look this weekend - the Christmas look! According to Arthur Sprecher, chairman of the local Community Christmas Decorations Committee, installation of the units and tree will be completed by that time.

This year's addition is more tree units for the community tree. Forty-five six-inch twinkling plastic balls equipped with colored lamps (red, green and yellow) that blink independently through concealed thermostats inside the lamps. The committee urges civic groups to use the location for carol singing. The group also announced that the candy cane board units which were no longer be used in Mount Joy have been sold to the Marietta Jaycees. Marietta Jaycees plan to renovate the units for use in their borough for the holidays.

Letters have again been issued as an appeal for funds to carry on this work. This year's expenditures will consist of insurance, erection, removal of units, storage and maintenance of equipment.

"Safety Doll" In Grade School
