Delta Street Project Moving Forward

The work list will be made up when available funds can be finally determined and schedules arranged.

The above list was prepared after members of the council's street committee, headed by Simeon Horton, made a survey of the borough and reviewed the needs from the standpoint of the condition of the various streets.

The ambitious program has been s'tated because slightly more money for street work will be available this season.

In addition to the usual amount of street funds included in the annual budget, there will be available a small amount unused last year. Added to that will be a special grant of money from outside sources which will add several thousand dollars.

The program is part of an over-all, long-range plan to return the borough streets to good condition following the installation of sewers.

Last year the borough improved Donegal street between Marietta and New Haven. The year before it was north Barbara. Prior to that Mount Joy street was rebuilt and others.

As part of the same program to return Mount Joy streets to good condition and to show a definite improvement, the council Monday took steps to install curbs in at least two locations.

One is along both sides of Donegal street between New Haven and Donegal Springs road.

A report showed that 15 property owners will be asked to make the improvements. Six properties already have curbing judged adequate and suitable.

The improvements are to be made by the property owners but minor repairs made necessary along the edge of the street surface by the construction will be handled by the borough.

A second—and much larger—program of curb installation is slated for Marietta avenue. Properties along that thoroughfare between Main street and Lumber street are involved.

No lists have been made as to how many new curbs will be needed.

Curbs along the old grade school property on Marietta street will be constructed by the borough at an estimated cost of \$800.

Target date for completing the curb installations on Marietta street is June 15.

It is hoped that any under-ground facilities along Marietta street can be improved this summer, thus clearing the way for a new street by the state.

Still another street building project calls for construction of Delta street, south of Columbia.

Necessary drains and water mains are now being installed. Specifications are being drawn by the borough's engineers and it is anticipated that on May 2 bids for the construction work will be opened.

Two-thirds of the costs are to be borne by the area developer, as agreements made between Nissley Gingrich and the borough.
