Harrisburg — Secretary of Forests and Waters Maurice K. Goddard said today that the deadline for procuring seedlings from State Forest Tree Nurseries has been extended to March 21 in order for the nurseries to dispose of as much existing stock as possible. Original deadline was February 15.

Species available are: White Pine, European Larch, Austrian Pine. Goddard said that the White Pine, in particular, is "an excellent three-year stock."

Interested land owners may place orders for seedlings and get planting information from John Kitch, service forester, Reinholds R1.

BUYING BABY CLOTHES

Well-made baby clothes give comfort and good service, says Mrs. Mae B. Barton, Penn State extension clothing specialist. When buying, select garments with smooth, flat seams and simple fastenings. Snaps, tapes, ties, and gripper fasteners are good choices. However, grippers frequently become damaged after long use and are hard to replace.

Buttons often break in laundering or the baby may pull them off.

CARE OF SEEDLINGS

Tree seedlings must be kept moist from the time they leave the nursery until they are planted, explains Walter Simonds, Penn State extension forester. He emphasizes that a good root system is essential to successful planting, but if the roots dry out rapidly they will be injured.

STAIRWAY LIGHTING FIXTURES

When selecting a ceiling fixture for near a stairway, be sure it has a closed top and fits close to the ceiling. Sanna Black, Penn State home management extension specialist, with such a fixture, persons descending the stairway won't be forced to look directly into bare bulbs.
