

# Donegal Considers Summer School

The Donegal Education Committee is considering the establishment of a summer school for high school students. The school would be held for six weeks during the summer months, with sessions held on Monday through Friday. Attendance will be voluntary, but once a pupil enrolls, attendance must be continuous.

Formal instruction on a group basis will be held on a minimum basis. Teachers will act as consultants, advisors, and helpers. The purpose will be more on an individual basis. The purpose calls for two sessions, each two hours long, each day. A pupil might study in one or two fields. School would probably be scheduled for July and early August. Transportation may or may not be provided.

If this summer school is established, it will be for pupils desiring to further their education. It is not for failing pupils to make up work. Failures may be made up in regularly accredited summer schools. This school will be for pupils as follows:

- Those desiring to enrich their educational background through experimental research, development of a special project, or study on a higher level.
  - Those desiring review work, or a refresher course in which they might have the opportunity to extend their knowledge in a subject recently studied and passed.
- Suggested fields of study might be English composition, science, mathematics and developmental reading.
- The idea was presented to the educational committee by Principal John G. Hart. Before presenting this program to the board for approval, the committee agreed that the P.T.A. be used as a medium for exploration.

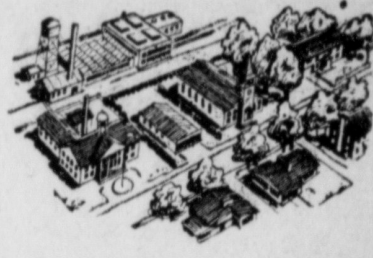
