

Manheim Girl Wins Scholarship

been awarded 1960 Pennsylvania Power & Light Company scholarships.

Virginia will attend Elizabethtown College, where she will major in science. A senior at Manheim Central High School, she is a member of the School Service Club, Glee Club, Girl's Chorus and the Girl Scouts of America, and is literary editor of the school yearbook.

Because of the great number of highly qualified applicants, the 1960 competition indicates "exceptional achievement" on the part of both students and educators. Applicants this year numbered 361, a seven per cent increase over last year.

Selection of the scholarship grantees was made by an independent scholarship awards committee, which has wide experience in judging the ability of high school students to do college work. The committee pointed out that there has been a steady improvement each year in the number of exceptionally qualified students applying for PP&L scholarships.

PP&L's scholarships provide for a total payment of \$2,000 toward each grantee's tuition for four years at any of 15 colleges and universities in Central Eastern Pennsylvania.

sylvania. An equal amount is paid to the college or university each grantee attends and is for the use of the institution in furthering its educational objectives. Grantees are free to pursue any four-year course of study leading to a degree.

Three young people from Lancaster County are now studying under similar scholarships. They are: Ira G. Nolt, Ephrata, a senior at Franklin & Marshall College where he is studying physics; Lois A. Mecum, of Lancaster, a junior at Dickinson College where she is preparing for a teaching career; and James A. DeLong, Elizabethtown, a sophomore at Susquehanna University, where he is taking the pre-theological course.
