Murphy Company Pays Dividends

G. C. Murphy Company's earnings for the first six months of this year were \$2,494,259 on sales of \$104,977,466. Sales were 6% higher than those of the previous year, but earnings declined slightly.

During the first 6 months of 1960 the company opened 11 stores and closed 1, for a net gain of 10. For the same period last year, three were opened and two closed. Expenses created by such openings are reflected in the earnings shown. Retailing has been confronted with several adverse factors during the first six months of this year, but traditionally produces greater part of its sales and profits during the last six months.

The company has 42 stores under construction or contract, compared with 26 at the same date last year. The majority of them are in shopping centers, and in new and recently-entered operating areas.

Held Over Big Spending Bills Facing Congress

New spending programs totaling Federal loans and grants to colleges, ed in legislation introduced shortly before Congress re-subsidized interest rate have be acted upon during the continued session. They included: S. 3780, by Sen. Randolph (D-W.Vo.), to amend the National Education Act so as to make grants to states for training and retraining unemployed or partly employed persons. An appropriation of \$12 million annually would be authorized for five years. S. 3812, by Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.), to establish a national security reserve of food, fiber and biological oil commodities to protect the United States against shortages in emergencies. This is a program which

has been proposed many times, and presumably would be used to hold huge surplus farm production, including the billions of dollars of food now owned or under loan by the Federal Government.

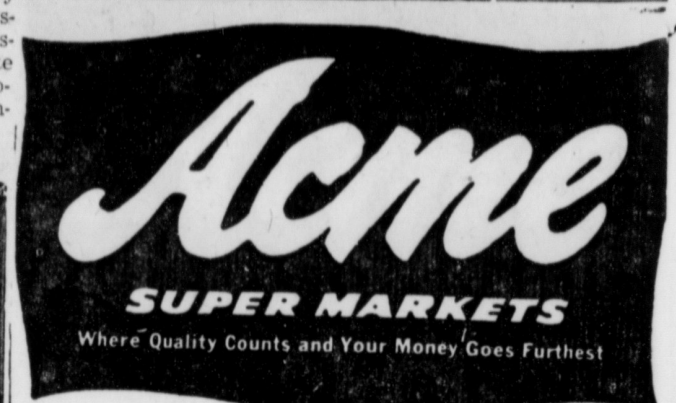
