White And Bronze Turkeys Gain Same In State Test

Harrisburg - At the end
of 12 weeks, there is a dif-
ference of only half a pound
between the average of all
white birds and all bronze
birds in the Pennsylvania
Turkey Meat Production
Test.

The average weight for all
bronze birds is 8.5 pounds and
the average for all white
birds is 8 pounds. The bronze
toms average 9.4 pound and
the hens 7.6 pounds. White
toms average 8.7 pounds and
the hens 7.2 pounds.

There are 947 bronze birds
(10 entries) and 764 white
birds (eight entries) in the
test which is supervised by
the Pennsylvania Department
of Agriculture's Bureau of
Markets.

Mortality for the bronze
entries has been 3.48 percent
and 3.8 percent for whites.
guests at the United Nat-
ed conversion ratios for all
entries is either 2.2 or 2.3.

Heaviest average weight for
toms is 10.1 pounds for a
bronze entry. However, a
white entry shows an aver-
age of 10.0 pounds for toms.
high school.

Best Food Buys. Hunters Influence Meat Prices

The small game hunting is
priced lower while lamb,
season is underway in Penn-
sylvania and game is report-
ed in good supply. This fact
is having an influence on
retail meat prices, reports
Tom Piper, Penn State Ex-
tension Marketing Agent.

The produce industry is
currently experiencing a lull
with prices, demand and
quality generally unsettled;
this is the result of the sea-
sonal shift from local to
more distant growing sec-
tions as a source of supply
for fresh fruits and vege-
tables.

Mushrooms, chestnuts, par-
snips, turnips, cranberries,
bunch radishes, pomegran-
tes and avocados are plenti-
fully supplied at bargain pri-
ces.

Bananas, grapefruit, Em-
peror grapes, and apples are
considered good buys in the
fruit line.

You Can Make A Feather Hat

Preserving pheasant feath-
ers for use on hats may be
easily done at home. To pre-
serve skin and feathers,
clean the skin well remov-
ing all fat and flesh. Place
feathers down, on sev-
eral layers of paper, and
sprinkle generously with
borax. Rub the skin and
feathers gently to remove
borax. Rub the skin to
soften it for easy shaping.
If strips of feathers are
desired, cut them with a
razor blade on the inside
skin.

To preserve feathers, re-
move oil from quill ends
with carbon tetrachloride or
other nonflammable clean-
ing fluid. Dust feathers with
borax and leave it on three
or four days, then brush
lightly to remove borax.

making feather hats. You

feathers directly on to the

CHUCK STEAKS

When cut from U. S.
Choice or comparable pack-
er grade, steaks from chuck
roasts may be grilled, says
Catherine Love, Penn State

some marbling, very little
connective tissue, and crea-
my colored fat are best for
grilling. Chuck may be cut
into small pieces and marin-
ated, then alternated with
fruits and vegetables on
skewers. Broiled indoors or
outdoors, these kabobs make
fine eating.

felt or crinoline. Some mil-
liners get more satisfactory
results by covering the crin-
oline forms with a thin
cotton jersey, stretching it
firmly over the base and an-
choring it in place. Then they
glue the feathers to the jer-
sey. Feathers may also be
hand - sewn to a foundation
of net, muslin or ribbon.
