The honor is the awarding of a Rotary Foundation Scholarship for a year's study abroad.

Several months ago, an announcement was made to Rotary clubs of this area, stating that this year recipient of scholarships would be from this part of the country and from this Rotary district.

The winner is permitted to spend a year of intensive study in any foreign country of their choice. However, one requirement was that the applicant be able to speak fluently the language of the country selected.
