Winter Driving

Most Dangerous
Driving after dark in winter demands extra care, special courtesy, special equipment—and, the driver who fails to realize this may find himself in special trouble, now that the season of short days and long nights is deepening.

This warning was issued this week by Police Chief, Mike Good of the Borough police department.

"It's a simple thing to understand," the chief said, "but how many drivers actually stop to realize that they can't see as well after dark as they can during the day? Even where the main business areas have a modern street lighting system I am sure nobody would claim it's as efficient as daylight."

"Consequently," the chief continued, "drivers must depend on their own car lights. They can't do this if those lights aren't operating fully and properly. In the interest of safety the officers of my department will be keeping an eye open for one-eyed cars, and they're also going to halt drivers whose stop lights aren't functioning. This is for their own protection as well as the safety of drivers following them."

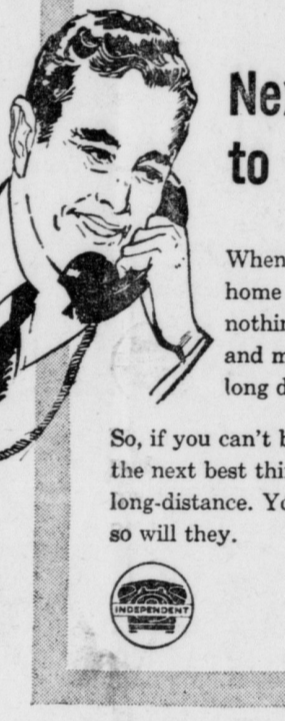
In addition to checking all their lighting equipment, drivers should brush up on nighttime driving courtesy, the chief advised.

"City driving calls for using the lower headlight beam most of the time," he pointed out. "Driving at legal speeds there are very few occasions when the use of bright beams would be advisable—and certainly not when meeting or following other drivers."

Another courteous action is to touch the brake pedal lightly a few times before braking, Chief Good declared. This gives the driver behind a little extra warning—which, on snow or ice with a chainless car, could prevent involvement in a rear-end collision, he said.

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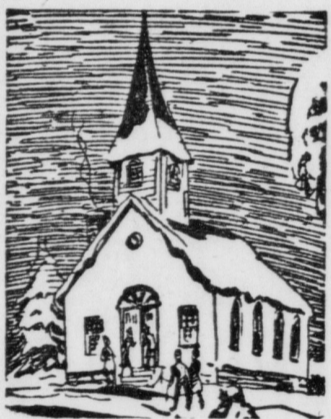
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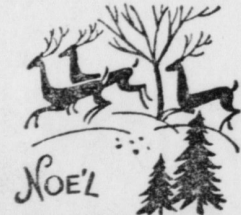
