Advisory Council  
At Wivell Home  
The Donegal Advisory  
Council met at the home of  
Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Wivell  
R1, Marietta, Pennsylvania,  
on Saturday evening to dis-  
cuss "Congressional Reap-  
portionment."  
Discussion leader Donald  
Ney told the group that  
Pennsylvania will lose three  
congressmen in 1963, bring-  
ing the number of U. S.  
Congressmen from 30 to 27.  
He stated that reapportion-  
ment is based on population.  
Even though Pennsylvania's  
population has increased since  
1950, the rate of increase  
has been less than that of  
some states. For example, in  
California the increase was  
46.5 per cent as compared  
with an increase of 7.1 per  
cent in our state.  
Using the average popu-  
lation figure per district  
(416,270) and "allowing a  
margin of 15 per cent, nine  
districts could remain intact.  
Four districts have popula-  
tion figures in excess while  
17 have fewer people than  
the average. The logical  
move, according to Ney, is  
to combine the smaller dist-  
ricts.
