### Bedford Countian Fills Local Conservation Post

Henry S. Mellott, formerly of Breezewood, Bedford County, began work this week with the Lancaster County Soil Conservation Office. ### Weather Effects Some Prices

Sub-freezing temperatures and heavy rains in growing areas have influenced the but at firm price levels. Values at the meat counter will vary from store to store and foodshoppers should study food ads carefully when planning the menu for next week. Steaks, fresh pork roasts, and poultry will be featured, but not likely in the same store. Crabmeats and radishes, peppers, and dumplings escaped serious damage and will continue at generally unchanged prices. Onion prices may show some increase as a result of a large export shipment to Europe. Supplies of both old and new crop cabbage are ample, holding this item on the list of good buys in produce. Brussel sprouts and cauliflower are available but prices are moving higher. Potatoes are plentiful and quality is excellent. Temperatures as low as 30 to 40 degrees below zero halted the loading operations temporarily in Maine, but not to the extent of influencing market supplies. Cold weather has influenced the normal handling of banana shipments in favor of the consumer. Look for this item to head the list of good buys in many local food markets this weekend. Movement of Delicious Stayman apples continues good at unchanged price levels; shipments are starting from controlled atmosphere storages in New York. ### 5 Game Lands Maintained In County

Lancaster County has five tracts of Game Lands that comprise a total of 5543 acres. In addition to supervising the five game lands, the Lancaster County Game Commission conducts four Cooperative Farm-Game projects in the county. M. D. Stewart, Supervisor of the Southeastern Division of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, reported this week there are 327 farmers with 31255 acres enrolled in cooperative Farm-Game projects. The Game Commission through its Lancaster County game protectors, John Eicholtz, John Haverstick, and Wallace Woodring, and Steve Maco, land manager in Lebanon and Lancaster Counties, carried out the program of conservation on the Game Lands and the Farm-Game projects.
