Mr. and Mrs. Claude B. Henderson of Elizabethtown, observed their 37th wedding anniversary on Tuesday.

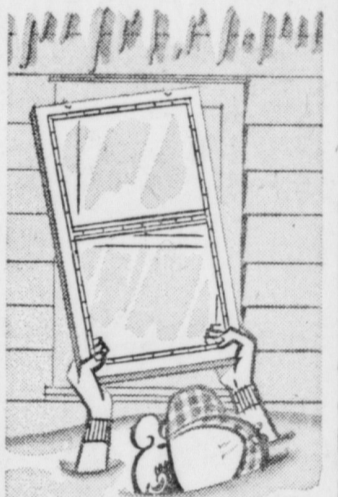
Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McMullen and children called on the Frank Singer family on Saturday afternoon.

Agricultural Adjustment

Weight watchers will be interested to know that dairy foods are relatively low in calories. At the same time, no other food group furnishes the quantity and diversity of essential nutrients as dairy foods. In other words, they're packed with nutrition per calorie.

"Agindustrial Adjustment in Pennsylvania" is the subject of a new booklet recently published by the Agricultural Experiment Station of the Pennsylvania State University.

The 32 page publication,

printed as the Summer 1961 issue of "Science For The Farmer" points out some of the major adjustments agriculture will be called upon to make as farming areas become more urbanized and industrialized.

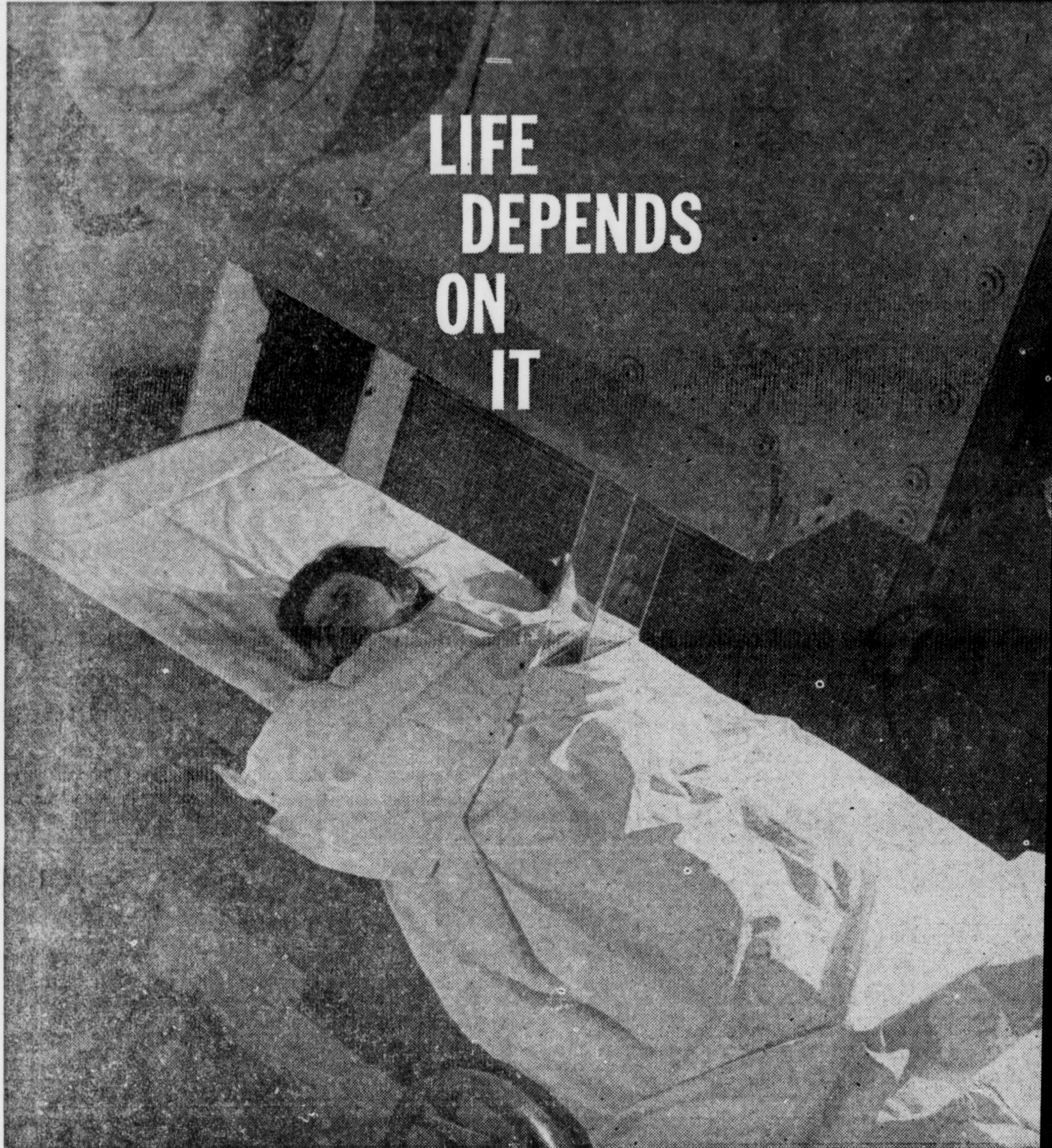
After an invitation to read the booklet, written by Dr. Lyman Jackson, Dean of the College of Agriculture, an over-all view leads into the
