PP&L Proposes Rate Reduction

A new tariff featuring a further reduction in rates for customers who heat their homes electrically was filed with the Public Utility Commission by PP&L Thursday, Feb. 15, it was announced by Chas. E. Oakes, PP&L board chairman and chief executive officer. Under the new tariff, scheduled to become effective April 16th after review by the commission, electric heating will cost only 1.5¢ per KWH. The reduction follows closely on the heels of a previous decrease effective last Sept. 1, to 1.65¢ per KWH.

A second feature of the new tariff is a special rate of 1.5¢ per KWH for electric heating of churches and schools.

Oakes said that "the new rate for residential users of electric heat represents a decrease of 9% from the present 'RH' rate for total electric living and a reduction of 21% from the rate in effect only 8 months ago."

G. C. Murphy Company earned \$3.80 per share, a 9.8% increase over the \$3.46 earned in 1960, based on the number of shares outstanding at the respective year-end, according to J. S. Mack, Chairman of the Board and President. Net earnings were \$7,951,093 compared with \$7,344,015 for 1960.

Gradually improving economic conditions in the last six months assisted the company's substantial recovery from the first half year's decline. During the year the company opened six Murphy stores and 14 Morgan & Lindsey units and closed four, including one destroyed by fire.

There are presently 32 locations under construction, lease or option including the Company's first store in Tennessee. Sales of \$256,419,909 for 1961 set a new record and the trend was continued in January of this year with an 18.6% increase.

Food Industry In Constant Change

A look at the calendar reminds us that the birthdays of Lincoln and Washington are being observed this month. If we should pause a moment to reflect on the changes in the food industry since the days of these famous men, we might be overwhelmed. Consider this when you visit the food market this week-end, suggests Tom Piper, Penn State Extension Marketing Agent and contrast the six to eight thousand items offered there with the few available in the little store where Lincoln worked as a clerk.

Here we are in the midst of winter and almost every type of fresh fruit and vegetable is available — more than 60 different items in this group. Of course not all are in the best buy class for inclement weather in southern and western growing areas has taken its toll. The main thing is that many are available and relatively few are really high in price.

All apples except the very best high colored Red Delicious are considered excellent buys as supplies continue much larger than a year ago. Florida grapefruit shipments have been heavy. Quality is good and wholesale prices slightly lower. Harvesting of Temple oranges is now at its peak. Prices have advanced somewhat on lighter supplies of the Pineapple variety and a light crop of Valencia oranges is in prospect for this year. California avocados should be reasonably priced this week.

Supplies of red cherries, both canned and frozen are very large. Prices are down particularly for frozen cherries. Watch for promotions of this colorful fruit for February desserts.

Potatoes stand alone as a clear cut good buy in vegetables. Green beans, mushrooms, broccolis and radishes are reasonably priced. Influence of weather conditions has forced prices up on most other items.

Fresh pork roasts and loins promise to lead the value class at most meat counters. A downward trend in price is noted on all beef cuts, although mid-western weather conditions could slow market deliveries and

Watered Hams Again Subject Of Controversy

Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman today stated that to protect the consumer of this country he must ask for reconsideration of a Court of Appeals decision that a ham with excess water added may be sold without being labeled "imitation."

The U. S. Court of Appeals ruled in Washington, D.C., Feb. 8 in favor of Armour and Company, which had contested the right of the Secretary of Agriculture to require watered hams to be marked "imitation ham."

Secretary Says Pa. Dog Law Is Successful

HARRISBURG — State Secretary of Agriculture William L. Henning today credited a stepped-up campaign against unlicensed dogs for a 7 per cent decrease in 1961 claims for damage by dogs.

"We again have lower claims — down to \$36,624 compared to \$39,290 the previous year," Henning said, "and the licenses increased from 868,504 individual and 5,938 kennels to 870,139 individuals and 6,103 kennels."

Henning also pointed out that there were 14 positive rabies cases, two of which were dogs, compared with 18 cases in 1960 and 43 cases in 1959.

The Department is readying its annual checkup to find unlicensed dogs across the state. Licenses, required for all canines over six months of age, can be purchased for \$1.10 (unspayed females, \$2.10) from county treasurers, justices of the peace, aldermen, magistrates, notaries public, or the State Department of Revenue.

The total revenue to the Commonwealth last year for dog licenses and fines amounted to \$1,195,691. There were 4,621 prosecutions compared to 3,175 in 1960.
