### Let Other Driver

#### Konw Your Plan

Let other drivers know what you intend to do, advises Edward P. Curran, Safety Director of Keystone Automobile Club.

"Whenever you are about to stop, slow down, or turn out of a straight line, you should signal your intentions without fail," he said. "If you don't give a signal until you already have started to turn or stop, you might as well not give it. By that time it is too late for other drivers to take whatever action might be necessary. The faster you are traveling, the farther in advance you should signal. On the open highway, it is a good rule to signal a about 300 feet in advance of any slowing, stopping, or turning movement.

"There are two kinds of signals for drivers, of course: hand signals and electrical signals. Hand signals are given with the left hand and arm extended from the driver's window, where possible. In vehicles closed against the elements, hand signals must be given in such manner as to be visible through the rear window of the car.

"Almost all cars have at least one electrical signal, the stop-light at the rear which glows when the brake pedal

is depressed. However, the stop-light does not always take place of the hand signal for indicating stopping or slowing down. Many times drivers slow down without touching the brake pedal and often come to a stop by using the brakes a relatively short distance.

"Flashing light signals for turns are legal substitutes for hand signals, but they are hard to see at times in late afternoon and early evening when the lowering sun is reflected off the light lenses. At night, to be sure, the flashing light signal is much more certain to be seen than a hand signal would be.

"The important thing, of course, is that a signal must be clearly seen and the manner in which it is given should depend upon the light conditions prevalent at the time. Both hand and electrical signals should be used if there is any doubt at all in the driver's mind concerning visibility."
