



Announce Winners Of SICO Scholarships

If you go dashing down Road 230 past the new Methodist church — Chiques church — without having a good look at the front lawn, you'll be not only driving too fast but you'll miss an extra Easter treat.

In the grass, just west of the brick monument on the front lawn, there is a cluster of spring flowers — purple and yellow.

And—fittingly enough, they are planted in the form of a cross.

Back at the old grade school site, things are happening toward developing the War Memorial Park.

Several old trees—dangerously hollow—are being taken down.

But, as is a wonderful relief from what is so often the case, the trees are being replaced with fine, young trees which will develop as the years go along.

Spanking new benches are beginning to appear and the entire project is moving along as the first of what looks like a busy summer in Mount Joy.

Too, digging has begun for the building of a monument which will display prominently the bronze plaque which for the past three or four years has been on a sign along Marietta street.





Authority Sets Fees For Installing New Copper, Water Service Lines

Costs of installing water service lines were reviewed Tuesday night at the Mount Joy Borough Authority held its April meeting in its office on Delta street.

A study showed that a previous estimate of \$125 per installation is completely realistic and that the service lines now being "dug in" on east Main street are averaging very close to that figure.

On that basis, the Authority has surveyed its overall policies, considered its financial position and has made its decision as to what charge to make the property owners.

The Tuesday action resulted in setting a flat charge of \$50 for installing a 3/4 inch copper service line and \$60 for putting in a 1-inch line of the same kind.

Thus, the property owners will have a substantial financial relief from a former policy of "no help" and the borough at the same time will be moving toward a plan of installing and maintaining the water system from the source through the treatment and storage plants, through the mains and then in through the service line to the property line of the user.

The present installation program, which is moving along rapidly—aided by unusually favorable spring weather—toward completion well ahead of the time when Main street is to be under construction during the summer months.

Also, at the Tuesday night meeting, the Authority took steps to clamp down on property owners who have not made necessary provisions in their plumbing for installation of water meters.

An agreement form is to be issued and about two weeks given for compliance.

If needed piping changes are not made within that time, the Authority said, water service will be disconnected until such time as changes are made satisfactorily.

Council also took steps to begin notification of property owners, where curbs are necessary, that new structures are to be installed.

Curbs, the council decided, will be needed along New Haven street and along Pinkerton road between Marietta and Columbia.

Although a specific date for bids to be opened on these projects was not set Monday night, the apparent intention of the Council was to push the projects as rapidly as possible.

Reports were given by committee heads, and discussion was held concerning the possibility of having a drinking fountain installed in the park, and of securing a flag from the American Legion.

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Borough Council Buys New Truck

He was named Monday night at the April meeting of the Mt. Joy Borough Council held in the Friendship Fire Company hall.

Groff replaces Anthony Warta, East Main street, who has submitted verbal resignation to Council President George Groff.

The appointment expires January 1, 1964.

In other business, council heard complaints about use of bows and arrows in the northeast part of the borough and about "dogs running loose" and about a matter of appointment of a borough health officer.

The latter problem involves a state regulation

which prohibits the health officer from being a member of the health board. It has been proposed that Warren Hayman, present health officer, resign from the board, that a new member be elected and that Hayman then be renamed health officer.

However, council declined to take any action until it has a resignation in hand from Hayman.

The council passed a needed ordinance giving permission to the state highway department to change certain grades and to do certain other work connected with the reconstruction of Main street this summer.

Plans, according to reports given council, are progressing rapidly on the Main Street project and it is anticipated that bids will be let late this month.

In the meantime, every effort is being made to have all underground utility services installed, renewed and placed in good condition to avoid any need for breaking into the new street surface.
