



Rotarians Give International Favors at Ladies Night

One of the most unusual ladies nights ever held by the Mount Joy Rotary club was staged Tuesday night at Hostetters when a completely international flavor was injected into the program.

Actually, there was no program as such. The evening was spent receiving gifts from far away places — some with even strange-sounding names.

What happened is this. Many weeks ago a committee headed by Adam Greer and assisted by Henry G. Carpenter, began writing letters to other Rotary clubs in all parts of the world, asking them to send gifts (about \$2 value, American money) to be used for the ladies night this month.

The gifts began pouring in from spots around the world. Some even from places where under most circumstances the mailing of packages to the U. S. might be difficult.

At the Tuesday night affair, the gifts were given as "favors" to the ladies, but the giving became a wonderful experience in international understanding. Henry G. Carpenter set the stage with an explanation and a specific admonition to write to the senders. "Perhaps the greatest international experience of the occasion may come from your writing of a letter of thanks to the senders," he said.

Many gifts were accompanied by letters — some in English, some in Spanish, some in French and some in English which obviously had been laboriously written by someone who was making an unusual effort to participate in a minor world-wide understanding through friendship.

From what countries did the gifts come? From Hong Kong, Japan, Switzerland, Lebanon, Italy, Rangoon, Singapore, Suez, Panama, New Zealand, Korea, Iceland, Angola, Puerto Rico, Dominican Republic, Canada, England, France, etc. etc.

One gift came air express — charges over \$6. A few gifts were left after each lady received one. Jake Ruhl, of Manheim, governor-elect of Rotary District 739, auctioned them off.

Entertainment was provided by a group of Donegal H. S. vocalists, directed by Carol Buchenauer.

What were the gifts? They were many and varied but most all directed to the ladies, as it has been explained in the letters sent from Mt. Joy. There were hand-made handkerchiefs, lace scarves, pins, jewel boxes, carvings, plaques, mats, etc.

Many reflected the \$2.00 which had been sent to cover the cost of purchase. Many however, indicated some person had spent perhaps much more than the \$2. Either that amount had been used to buy a bargain or U. S. dollars had terrific buying power in some countries.

For instance, a beautiful skirt, a hand-woven rug, beautifully dressed native dolls.

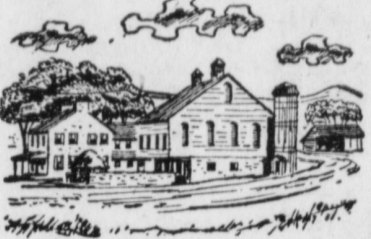

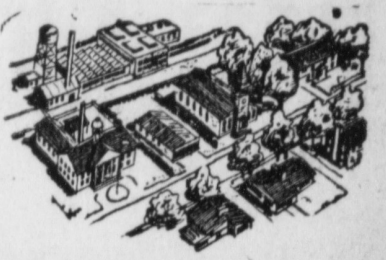

Court Opens Legal Road Block To Florin Annexation Proposal

A point of law is settled and the Florin annexation case takes one step forward.

Friday, May 11, a decision was handed down in court settling the question as to whether or not a person who has signed a petition may withdraw his name.

After many months following a hearing, decision

was reached rather quickly subsequent to formal presentation of arguments.

The Florin annexation case now stands in such a way that commissioners are to be appointed by the court to study the problem and make a report.

Following review of the commissioners' findings, the court will make a ruling on whether or not Florin may be annexed.

Because the number of persons petitioning "for" and "against" annexation is relatively close, the court has resorted to a commission method of approaching the annexation matter. It has been used on previous occasions and that time in connection with an annexation in Lancaster.

Mount Joy Telephones Join Three D Nation-Wide System Early Sunday

When subscribers of Columbia Telephone Company pick up their telephone on Sunday, after 3:01 a.m., the entire nation will be at their fingertips.

Telephone subscribers will be able to dial direct, station-to-station telephone calls throughout the United States and portions of Canada.

This new telephone service, Hawaii, California, portions of Canada and nearby states are as close as the telephone.

Final checks and test calls on the direct distant dialing equipment in all of the Columbia Telephone Company's central offices are being completed this week for the new long distance service.

Information brochures containing complete dialing instructions for long distance calls, and an Area Code Handbook containing a list of cities and towns that can be dialed direct are being mailed to subscribers this week.

For the individual subscriber to avail himself of this new service, it is only necessary for him to follow the simple, easy to read directions in the brochure.

Also on the same date, subscribers of the Columbia Telephone company will be able to make use of toll-free service between Columbia and Elizabethtown, and Mt. Joy and Mountville. This is another improvement in the service furnished by the Columbia Telephone company, one of America's 3,035 independent companies which help to form the greatest communications system.

The telephone company has made a large investment in the equipment which will enable its subscribers to avail themselves of this new, fast method of making station-to-station long distance calls, and will, in the future, make other substantial investments in order to continue to furnish the most modern up to date service for its subscribers.

The directors of both banks signed the completed application which was filed by the bank's legal counsel. The banks expect that the Comptroller will release his decision within sixty days.

The stockholders of the two banks will be notified of a meeting within the next 40 days, at which time they will vote on the merger.

Mount Joy Voters Follow Pattern Of Parties Throughout Pennsylvania

Mount Joy voters, apparently, wanted about what the majority of voters in Pennsylvania wanted.

A look at Tuesday's election returns shows that the Democrats locally liked Richard Dilworth, former mayor of Philadelphia and that the Republicans favor William Scranton.

In East Ward voting, Dilworth polled 20 votes, Charles Schmitt, 5 and Harvey Johnston, 7. The West Ward Democrats split — Dilworth 57, Schmitt 3, and Johnston 6. Thus, the percentage of leanings ran somewhat similar on both ends of the borough.

Republicans, however, were not as convincingly consistent. The West Ward liked Scranton 80 to 43 over Lancaster County J. Collin McCarran while the East Ward expressed only slight preference for 70 to 65.

In the West Ward, the Republicans officially named Richard Divit and Vera E. Albert committeeman and committeewoman while the Democrats elected Paul Hipple and M. June Smith.

East Warders gave approval to Cyrus G. Gainer and Christine Brown as Democratic committee leaders and the Republicans voted in George Brown II and Florence Starr. None of the committeemen were opposed.
