This year Mount Joy is having a special event and is planning more activity, which will no doubt bring a few people to town. Thus, "Fly the Flag."

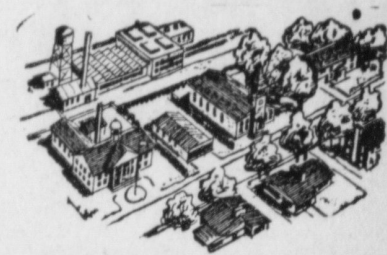
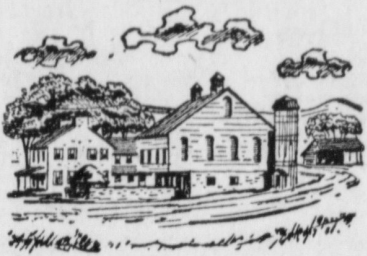

A Mount Joy man mingled last weekend with the Kennedy clan. And we do mean John F. Kennedy's of 800 Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, D. C.

To begin, you must recall that in the Lancaster Sunday papers there appeared a picture of Mrs. Kennedy and Miss Peggy Steinman of Lancaster.

The picture appeared because Miss Steinman, herself a horsewoman, had been invited to Virginia. She mentioned at home that Mrs. Kennedy also would be a guest. That started the wheels moving.

Marshall Dussinger, who incidentally was a former Bulletin photographer, now a cameraman with the Lancaster Sunday News, was called at his home here Saturday morning and ordered to hurry to Lancaster, take a plane to Leesburg and to get picture.

That he did, arriving shortly after noon. Few people apparently knew that the wife of the president was attending the rather small show.

But, the first persons Dussinger met as he walked onto the show lot were a couple broad-shouldered secret service men. "No pictures," they said. But, they admitted it was a public place and he was sympathetic with Dussinger's problem and with necessity of accomplishing his assignment.

While the secret service men — about a dozen of them, apparently — kept tabs on Dussinger and not "give him a bad" they did NOT cooperate and Dussinger was obliged to shoot when and as he could under anything but ideal circumstances. They and they made it stick keep him at a distance from the famous young seamstress.

As he talked Monday morning about his interesting assignment, Dussinger lovingly patted the blonde head of his own daughter, Marsha, and talked of how Caroline Kennedy frolicked about the show and finally said to her mother, "I want a drink of water." Mother promptly went to a station wagon, brought out a thermos and poured the drink.

Utility workmen have had their work slowed down considerably recently as new pipes are installed ahead of the Main street rebuilding program.

For the present, the water line installation is almost finished. The gas company, however, has run into a lot of trouble near the corner of Main and High Streets.

In an operation which involves laying a brand new pipe at a depth of about eight and a half feet, the workmen ran into a shelf of rock. Because they cannot use blasting powder, it has been necessary to use airhammers and to drill and blow away almost an inch at a time.

The present plan is to continue the main on eastward Jacob street. Later, services will be run from the main into homes and businesses.

In the meantime, another dig is being done in other areas on West Main street. Another big digging project in Mount Joy is continuing "full steam ahead" at the site of the new swimming pool. In fact concrete pourings were being poured at the time.

VFW Pushes '62 Buddy Poppy Sale

Comander Martin Brown of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 5752 this week spelled out the exact channels into which funds collected in the V.F.W.'s annual Buddy Poppy drive would be placed. He said he was making the statement so that all citizens in the area will know just where their money was going.

"The manner in which buddy poppy funds may be spent," the commander said, "is regulated by the National By-Laws. Disbursements are strictly confined to the following purposes:

"For the aid, relief and comfort of disabled and needy veterans, their dependents and their widows and orphans.
"For maintenance or expansion of the VFW National Home for widows and orphans of veterans at Eaton Rapids, Mich.
"For hospitals or individual assistance and entertainment for needy veterans or service patients, and their dependents.
"For rehabilitation, welfare and service work, including liaison service with the Veterans Administration.
"For necessary expense for military funerals of deceased veterans.
"For acquisition, improvement and maintenance of burial plots, and decoration of graves of veterans and service men.
In each VFW community, Commander Brown said, more than one-half of the total Buddy Poppy receipts are used for local veteran welfare.

Telephones Make Switch To DDD

Introduction of Direct Distance Dialing, the fast, convenient dial-it-yourself long distance telephone service was carried out smoothly and swiftly as planned, early last Sunday morning. Columbia Telephone officials reported that traffic volume was unusually heavy for a Sunday, indicating great public interest in the new service which permits telephone customers in the Columbia, Elizabethtown, Marietta, Mount Joy and Mountville to dial most of their long distance station-to-station telephone calls.

George Datesman, Plant Manager stated "Most of those who tried the new service last Sunday followed instructions to the letter and completed their calls without incident. Although it is still very early to judge public reaction, we have had many complimentary reports and feel confident telephone users in general will accept this advancement in the field of telephone communication with enthusiasm."

The distinction of dialing the first official call through the new system here in Mt. Joy went to Mayor Frank B. Walters. On hand for the inauguration of the service were Robert E. Long, Secretary and Treasurer; Paul C. Holder, Wire Chief; Clark G. Berrier, Chief Switchman; Joseph V. Finegan, Installation and Maintenance Foreman; Ted Weston, Automatic Electric Company Installation Foreman.
