Rev. Bowers To Preach First Sermon Here July 22

The Rev. Theodore E. Bowers, who was graduated in June from the Winebrenner Theological Seminary of Findlay, Ohio, will assume the pastorate on Sunday, July 22, of the Mount Joy Church of God.

92nd Annual Camp Meeting

The 92nd annual session of the Landisville Camp Meeting will be held from July 14 to 22, inclusive, with Rev. G. Ernest Thomas as evangelist. The public is invited to all services.

The new pastor succeeds the Rev. Donald Cochick, who has accepted a call to Christian service in Litzitz. Rev. Bowers is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward C. Bowers of Ellwood City, Pa.

Rev. Thomas is director of spiritual life for the General Board of Evangelism of the Methodist church, with headquarters in Nashville, Tenn. A native of England, a graduate of Boston U. and an author of several books, he is a national leader in his field.

Previous to his studies at Winebrenner, he received an A.B. degree from Geneva College in Beaver Falls, Pa. While in seminary, he worked at the Eastman Kodak company in Findlay and held a pastorate in two E.U.E. churches in the Findlay area.

Other leaders at the camp will include Rev. Stewart Kreiss of Philadelphia, Rev. Warren C. Reidel of Lancaster; Rev. Charles Yrigoyen of Lancaster; Mrs. Glen I. Poulton, a student organization on campus.

This past seminary year, Rev. Bowers served as secretary of the Winebrenner Union, a student organization on campus.

President of the Camp Meeting is John Dillinger of Mount Joy.

Rev. Bowers is married to the former Lowanda L. Price of Mt. Blanchard, Ohio, and they are the parents of an infant son, Brian Edward. Mrs. Bowers was graduated magna cum laude from Findlay college.
