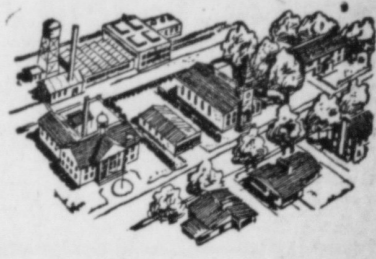

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Civilian Defense Organization Active

Mount Joy's Civilian Defense organization, as probably all groups across the country, are now on a standby basis.

Mayor Frank Walter said Wednesday that he has been in contact with the Lancaster County CD officials and that the word from Harrisburg is that all units should be "standby."

This does not mean "alert" for no directions have been given. The order, apparently was more of a reminder to "be prepared."

Mayor Walter said that Mt. Joy's civilian defense organization within the past few months has been reactivated and that now all divisions are staffed and ready.

A certain amount of equipment has been provided and those who have responsibilities have been given instruction and a certain amount of practice.

The Washington, D. C. orders issued Wednesday were to the effect that all units should "standby for maximum duty" and to be in readiness for full action.

The Mount Joy C.D. director is Mike Pricio, and the assistant director is James Heilig.

Among the divisions of organization are such things as communications, transportation, police security, etc.

The school board previously has given thought and planning to the care and handling of children in an emergency. Tuesday's session will be the School Board's committee on Transportation.

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Much Action On Street Building Job All Along Length of Construction Area

If all goes well and the weatherman cooperates, there will be some very big steps taken within the next few days on the Main street rebuilding project.

First, blacktopping is slated for next week. The plan calls for the first material to be spread on the length of Main street which is now paved from curb to curb. That area is from Barbara to a point almost in front of the door of Trinity Lutheran church.

Secondly, one of the busiest Main street crossings — at Barbara — is due to be reopened by the weekend. Closed nearly a week now, while an important link of concrete is poured, forms were being installed Tuesday and pouring was scheduled Wednesday and Thursday. A special quick set concrete is to be used which will allow traffic again within about three days.

Usually, the new concrete strips must cure for 7 to 10 days.

It is pointed out that the quick set material is more expensive but its use is justified in certain areas where there are traffic problems.

There have been serious traffic difficulties at Barbara and Main but the new pavement will begin to improve the situation.

In the meantime, excavation of the south half of the Main street eastward from Barbara virtually has been completed, opening the way for the beginning of underground construction — gas, water, sewer and drainage facilities.

On the west end of the project, the New Haven street crossing continued closed but one strip of concrete was laid through the area this week.

Another will be begun when the first has had at least a week to cure.

Word this week is that 1962 construction will extend only to the railroad and that nothing will be done this fall or winter to the section between the railroad and the west edge of the borough which is just located near the west edge of the Mount Joy Paper Box company's plant.

Concreteing will be halted at the east side of the railroad and will be brought to the present grade of the tracks.

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Lions Invite All Kiddies To Halloween Party

There will be no judging of any kind but treats will be distributed following the show.

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
